ORDINANCE No. 185 An ordinance to amend, revise, and re-enact Sections Nos. 2, 8 and 10 of Ordinance No. 111 of the City of Las Vegas, entitled, "An ordinance prohibiting the manufacture, storage or keeping, sale, offering or exposing for sale or barter, or other disposal of intoxicating liquors in the City of Las Vegas, regulating other matters pertaining thereto; providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance, and repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict therewith." approved May 5, 1925, as amended by Ordinance No. 178; and to repeal all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict therewith.

The Board of Commissioners of the City of Las Vegas do ordain, as follows: Section 1. Section 2 of said Ordinance No. 111, as amended by Section 1 of Ordinance No. 179 of the City of Las Vegas, is hereby amended, revised and re-enacted so that the same shall read as follows: "Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to manufacture, keep or store, sell, offer or expose for sale or barter, or otherwise dispose of, except as hereinafter provided, any intoxicating liquors in the City of Las Vegas; provided, that nothing in this ordinance shall prohibit the manufacture, sale, keeping or storing of said liquors where the manufacture, sale, keeping or storing of the same is permitted by the laws of the State of Nevada or of the United States of America."

Section 2. Section 3 of said Ordinance No. 111, as amended by Section 2 of Ordinance No. 179 of the City of Las Vegas, is hereby amended, revised and re-enacted so that the same shall read as follows: "Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to have upon his person or in any vehicle, any intoxicating liquors on any public street or alley, or in any public place in the City of Las Vegas."

Section 3. Section 10 of said Ordinance No. 111, as amended by Section 3 of Ordinance No. 179 of the City of Las Vegas, is hereby amended, revised and re-enacted so that the same shall read as follows: "Section 10. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than one Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) nor more than Four Hundred Ninety-nine Dollars (\$499.00), or be imprisoned in the city jail until such fine is paid at the rate of not exceeding one day for each two dollars of such fine in case such fine is not paid, or by imprisonment in the city jail not exceeding six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment."

Section 4. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. Section 5. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and adoption and publication for one week (six issues) in Las Vegas Age, a daily newspaper published in the City of Las Vegas. Section 6. The City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of City Commissioners of the City of Las Vegas is hereby authorized and directed to have this Ordinance No. 185 published one week (6 issues) in Las Vegas Age, a daily newspaper published in the City of Las Vegas.

Passed and adopted this 4th day of February, A. D. 1932 by the following vote: Commissioners Thomas and Hansell and His Honor the Mayor E. W. Cragin, voting aye. Noes, Commissioners Mundy and German. STOCK VALUES JUMP ON N. Y. BOARD

NEW YORK, Feb. 11. (U.P.)—The value of American securities increased nearly \$2,500,000,000 on the New York stock exchange today. That was Wall Street's answer to the administration's new plan to expand bank credit as a means of promoting business recovery. Commodities, which have sagged lately, made similar response to the credit news and the entire financial community's spirits lifted. The buying demonstration in the stock market was the most impressive in months. In addition to swelling the open market value of all listed stocks by nearly \$2,500,000,000, millions more were added by the upturn in bonds and commodity prices. So heavy was the buying of stocks by nervous buyers and new investors that stock tickers ran several minutes behind trading on the floor during the morning dealings. Prices were sharply higher at the outset and continued their advance to the close at their best levels. Gains in the active leaders ranged to half dozen points, while the speculative Auburn Auto soared nearly 20 points at one time. Many traders were cheered by the new credit plan of the administration, which is designed to promote business recovery through stabilization of profits and relaxation of credit strings. This would be accomplished by allowing federal reserve banks to discount additional credits and by making use of idle gold reserves for money expansion. Scenes on the floor of the stock exchange were mildly reminiscent of the bull market days. Loud cheers went up every time the leaders engaged in a spurt. A few traders were of the opinion that a new bull market had started because the rally in the market today removed the threat of prices breaking below the extreme bear market lows established on January 5.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 11. (U.P.)—Stocks, bonds and commodities swept upward today in response to the administration's latest step to aid business by loosening credit strings. Stocks soared their widest gains since late last fall and recovered most of the ground lost during recent falling prices. Gains in the leaders were impressive, ranging from one to half a dozen points in the active shares. The volatile Auburn Auto soared nearly 20 points at one time.

In the commodity markets, grains gained more than a cent a bushel, cotton \$1 a bale and minor markets like sugar, coffee, silk, wool and cottonseed oil proportionately. Under the administration's new credit expansion program, introduced into congress today, rediscount privileges of the federal reserve banks would be broadened to include many additional securities and some use would be made of the current large stocks of gold for expansion of currency along sound lines.

Bankers widely approved the measure as one of the most important steps yet taken to promote industrial recovery. They bought large blocks of leading stocks, a move that put the overextended bear crowd into disorganized retreat. Once the upswing in stocks was underway it was augmented by announcement of the Ford Motor Co. that it would begin quantity production of its new 8-cylinder model before the close of the month, and by the action of the Union Pacific directors in ordering the regular quarterly dividend of \$2.50 a share on the common stock, a move that had been doubted by Wall Street. Accompanied by cheers from traders the stock market opened with a burst of strength and immediately resumed its upswing on a heavy volume of trading. The list pushed steadily ahead to the close when best levels were reached.

Turnover was double yesterday's sales of 1,300,000 shares and brokers looked forward to greater commissions. Several times during the morning trading tickers fell several minutes behind trading on the floor, so great was the activity. The quick turn in prices gave much encouragement to bull forces inasmuch as prices for several days have been threatening to break below the bear market lows established early in January. A break below these levels might have signalled another phase of the bear market. As today's recovery lifted prices from these levels, a few of the more optimistic traders claimed that the bear market was ended. Grains in leaders like United States Steel, Consolidated Gas, American Telephone, Case, American Can and Du Pont, which ranged from more than 4 to nearly 8 points, were particularly encouraging to bull forces as was the short squeeze in Auburn Auto. Measured by market averages, the advance was the widest since December 18.

Second to the new credit policy, the Ford new model announcement was the most important piece of constructive news the street has seen in weeks. Production of the new model will stimulate material production for the new model and induce new public buying.

FORD ANSWERS QUERY WITH NEW CAR

DETROIT, Feb. 11. (U.P.)—Henry Ford gave his answer today to shrinking automobile sales by announcement of a new eight-cylinder car, and an improved, roomier, four-cylinder model.

The new machines, with a single chassis built to carry either engine, Ford hopes to be able to sell at the lowest price ranges ever offered in automobile history. He will not know these figures himself, however, until sometime before the first public showings, expected around March 1.

No details of the new cars were revealed other than that there would be roomier bodies of wholly new design, longer wheel-base, lower hung chassis and heavier frames. It has been reported but not officially confirmed, that Ford will not include any extra equipment in the list price, letting dealers supply these, and that any color other than black will cost extra.

The decision was an epochal one for the man now rapidly approaching his 69th birthday. At a time when the buyers' market is regarded as the lowest in decades, the billionaire has spent an estimated \$500,000 in changing equipment, and will have 100,000 men at work in a few weeks turning out thousands of new cars. In addition, for the first time in the 29 years history of his company he had "split attention" between models, a move other manufacturers long have predicted would give them a chance to match the low costs of his mass buying and production.

The ruddy-faced billionaire made up his mind suddenly about Dec. 6 to sweep aside elaborate plans for concentrating on a four only and leaving the eight for "better times." At that time 35,000 of the new model A's had gone through the factory.
