## BODELL FINDS B. C. SUSPECT QUARRY HAS 'CHANGED' LOCATED IN VEGAS

Caught in the act of attempting to disguise himself in a Las Vegas auto camp, A. A. Meyers, suspected by Boulder City police of being one of the chief reservation bootlegging outfits, was arrested Saturday morning in this city.

Chief of Police Bodell noticed Meyers leaving the dance Friday night at Boulder at frequent intervals, each time with different men. Investigation indicated that Meyers was allegedly selling liquor and he and his car were seized by reservation officers. A quantity of liquor in a specially hidden container, was also reported to have been found.

Meyers is said to have escaped from the officers, however, while en route to the Boulder City police station. Chief of Police Bodell followed him into Las Vegas and discovered him in an auto camp there while attempting to disguise himself. His clothes had been changed and his hair powdered.

Dodging and racing desperately through a Boulder City lumber yard early Friday morning, a would-be burglar was shot by Chief of Police Bud Bodell, but managed to escape, leaving a trail of blood.

It was announced yesterday, however, that a man answering the description of the fugitive had been located in Westside, and that the man was wounded. Although he claimed he received the injury when he fell off a loaded wood wagon, Bodell planned to make a thorough check this morning.

Bodell discovered the man in the act of breaking into the Browder restaurant in the reservation city. Calling to the man to surrender, he was finally forced to fire to stop him. The man cried out and fell, but struggled up and fled into a lumber yard. There, Bodell and his quarry played a game of hide and seek, tripping and running through the dark, with possible death as a penalty for the loser.

Bodell called to the man to stop several times, and twice was in a position for another shot, when tripped by boards and his heavy overcoat.
