LEGAL NOTICES

ORDINANCE NO. 185

An ordinance to amend, revise, and re-enact Sections Nos. 2, 8 and 10 of Ordinance No. 111 of the City of Las Vegas, entitled, "An ordinance prohibiting the manufacture, storage or keeping, sale, offering or exposing for sale or barter, or other disposal of intoxicating liquors in the City of Las Vegas, regulating other matters pertaining thereto; providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance, and repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict therewith." approved May 5, 1925, as amended by Ordinance No. 179; and to repeal all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict therewith.

The Board of Commissioners of the City of Las Vegas do ordain, as follows:

Section 1. Section 2 of said Ordinance No. 111, as amended by Section 1 of Ordinance No. 179 of the City of Las Vegas, is hereby amended, revised and re-enacted so that the same shall read as follows: "Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to manufacture, keep or store, sell, offer or expose for sale or barter, or otherwise dispose of, except as hereinafter provided, any intoxicating liquors in the City of Las Vegas; provided, that nothing in this ordinance shall prohibit the manufacture, sale, keeping or storing of said liquors where the manufacture, sale, keeping or storing of the same is permitted by the laws of the State of Nevada or of the United States of America."

Section 2. Section 8 of said Ordinance No. 111, as amended by Section 2 of Ordinance No. 179 of the City of Las Vegas, is hereby amended, revised and re-enacted so that the same shall read as follows: "Section 8. It shall be unlawful for any person to have upon his person or in any vehicle, any intoxicating liquors on any public street or alley, or in any public place in the City of Las Vegas."

Section 3. Section 10 of said Ordinance No. 111, as amended by Section 3 of Ordinance No. 179 of the City of Las Vegas, is hereby amended, revised and re-enacted so that the same shall read as follows: "Section 10. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) nor more than Four Hundred Ninety-nine Dollars (\$499.00), or be imprisoned in the city jail until such fine is paid at the rate of not exceeding one day for each two dollars of such fine in case such fine is not paid, or by imprisonment in the city jail not exceeding six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment."

Section 4. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. Section 5. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and adoption and publication for one week (six issues) in Las Vegas Age, a daily newspaper published in the City of Las Vegas. Section 6. The City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Las Vegas is hereby authorized and directed to have this Ordinance No. 185 published one week (six issues) in Las Vegas Age, a daily newspaper published in the City of Las Vegas. 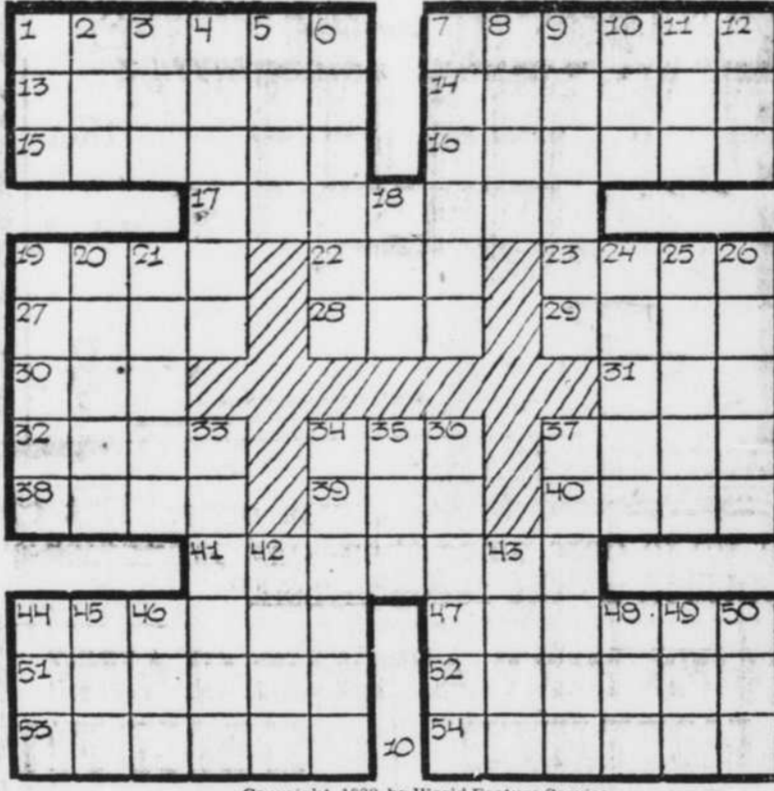

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 13. (U.P.)—The most furious wave of buying of the year swept American markets today, sending stock prices up one to 17 points, increasing stocks, bonds and commodity values \$5,000,000,000 and lifting the range of the week's gain to \$10,000,000,000 or \$80 for every man, woman and child in the United States.

The stock market, as always the pace setter, opened with a bang. In the first half hour 700,000 shares, 800,000 shares were bought and at the close the new high-speed tickers, designed for a booming market and though capable of taking care of the most extensive operations, were six minutes behind.

The closing gong was hardly audible and it was several minutes before the uproar on the floor abated. Sweating, panting, coatless men, hoarse from shouting, regretfully left the floor. All morning the little square black boxes that are the new style fast tickers had been stuttering out a frenzied melody of dollars that meant fortunes for the bulls and ruin for the bears who futilely and feebly attempted to cover under the avalanche of buying.

Spurring out a jumble of figures and letters, these drab metal boxes took treading dramatic form as they labored and churned in their mission of reporting the rising and ebbing of American industry. At the opening, there was a slight jerk and the yellow tape began to jerk out bearing the opening prices in symbols like these: "Gt 1 1/2; px 8 1/2; cn 3; nw 10 1/2; wx 1 1/2; nsb 5 1/4; k 13 1/2."

There was a pause of a mere instant, then a terrific churning, the yellow tape was spurting out now in longer and longer takes.

Here it comes! Here comes X, or rather United States Steel, old J. P. Morgan's billion dollar combine, the market leader, good old Steel! 47 1/2, up 4. Come on, Steel! Make those bears cover.

Look what they're doing with T, or if you prefer, American Telephone & Telegraph. The bulls are kicking AT&T up like a football. AT&T, at 128, up 9 1/2. You can fairly hear the bears squealing and the roar of the bulls. And here comes AAC, or if you are not a tape reader, Auburn, favorite of the speculators. If you say it's up, Auburn is up. There it is. It's up! It's 120, up 9 1/2.

This continued throughout the two hour session, except for brief lulls, when bears vainly sought to turn the market and bulls indulged in profane talking before renewing their assault which was irresistible.

BUILDING TRADE WORKERS ACCEPT 20 PER CENT CUT

CHICAGO, Feb. 12. (U.P.)—One hundred fifty thousand Chicago building trade workers announced as their valentine gift toward prosperity their tentative gift toward prosperity of 20 per cent wage reduction.

"We made the sacrifice to stimulate business and to give a chance for employment to the great numbers of our workers who have been out of work," explained P. L. Sullivan, chairman of the union leaders.

GAS VICTIMS

DETROIT, Feb. 13. (U.P.)—The lifeless forms of five persons, an unemployed father, his wife, two of their children and a small niece, tonight were found stretched on the floor of their small frame house here, apparently stricken by monoxide poisoning from a leaky gas heater.

The activity on the curb exchange and in other major American markets for the exchange of stocks, bonds and commodities, was at an equal pace. It was the continuation of an upward drive that began Thursday with announcement of the new federal reserve credit extension plan. But today's optimism was even more pronounced than Thursday's favorable comment on America's plan to lift herself out of the economic doldrums by her own boot straps, poured in from all parts of the world.

The gains were reflected in all the last half hour of trading. The leaders closed only slightly below their highs for the day.
