 making similar assaults on uniformed police engaged in performing necessary duty in the Hong-kew area.

The American official was accompanied by two armed Japanese interpreters, yet he experienced the greatest difficulty in reaching Mrs. Young's home. When he arrived, the six Japanese civilians, he claimed, refused to believe his declarations that Mrs. Young was an American and set upon her kicking and beating her.

RINGWALT BEATEN
 Ringwalt went into action himself, defending the woman to the best of his ability, but said he was severely beaten and kicked.

After this free-for-all, Ringwalt succeeded in stopping the attackers long enough to show them his credentials and demanded respect for an American consular officer. The Japanese searched him for firearms, after which he was released. Search for Mrs. Young's child was futile and Ringwalt and Mrs. Young returned to the consulate general, reporting the case to Cunningham.

Ringwalt has been one of the most active officials here in rescuing Americans from the danger zone.

CHINA TO RESIST

GENEVA, Feb. 13. (U.P.)—China announced late tonight that she would resist Japanese attacks at all points with all forces at her command.

A Chinese communique said China adhered to its faith in world justice "despite the failure so far of pacific agencies," but would continue to resist Japanese attacks in self-defense.

AWAIT OPENING FOR PEACE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13. (U.P.)—While 45,000 men turned China's chief commercial city into an inferno of shot and snell today, the western nations waited, apprehensive but helpless, for a favorable moment to propose peace terms.

The major battle now raging at Shanghai was regarded here as inevitable. Statesmen concluded that Japan feels it must "have face by driving Chinese troops from Shanghai, if humanly possible." Two unsuccessful attempts have been made to preserve peace.

LAUGH AT PACT STORY

MOSCOW, Feb. 13. (U.P.)—Foreign reports of a Soviet preparation for war and of a secret treaty regarding Manchuria between Russia and Japan were received in official quarters today with amusement and ridicule.
