WEATHER MAN PLAYS PRANKS IN B. C. AREA

Boulder City has sprung some surprises on the weather man for the past year, and last week end proved no exception.

The drizzling rain that fell all day Sunday turned into a sleet storm of no mean proportions which lasted with a few intermissions until noon yesterday, when the sun burst through the low hanging clouds and melted the snow on the low-lands, though the hill tops surrounding the city remained snow-capped.

Sunday's inclement weather was rendered doubly disagreeable by a cold wind, which died down when the sun appeared.

U. S. GARAGE WORK PUSHED

The government garage on Nevada boulevard and Avenue B, now under construction by White and Ailer, contractors, will be complete about April 1. It was announced by Claud H. White, in charge of construction.

The brick walls are nearly laid and the roof will be put on within the next two weeks.

The building is 72 by 151 feet, of which 30 by 72 feet will be used to house the Boulder City fire department.

The other section of the building will be used for a repair shop and storage space for government cars, and will be put into service as soon as the building has been accepted.

PLANS SMALL B. C. HOMES

Formerly part owner of the Boulder City Auto court, Ben Vaughn has disposed of his interests in the auto court and now plans to build several residence units in Boulder City, it was learned yesterday.

Vaughn plans to erect the homes on a plot of ground across from the auto court, each to be a double unit with showers, toilets, and other modern plumbing and fixtures. Single units are to be added later, according to present plans.

ENGINEER TO TEST PLANTS

Having designed the Boulder City filtration and sewage disposal plants, Burton Lowther, Denver consulting engineer retained by the Reclamation bureau, arrived in the Dam city yesterday for a complete test and check of the two recently completed plants.

Lowther is a consulting sanitary engineer who was asked to design the two plants, having had a wide variety of experience with such plants in many localities.

Following a complete test to be made by Lowther, both plants are to swing into full operation almost at once, Reclamation officials said yesterday.

LARGE PUMPS AWAIT ACTION

Planning to have the full forces of the tunnel crews on the job by the time the graveyard shift goes to work at eleven thirty tonight, Six Companies are massing their powerful pumps at strategic points in the tunnels preparatory to pumping the excess water from the workings.

After reaching a maximum height of approximately 16 feet above normal, the river was down to within five or six feet of normal last night, and huge pumps were made ready to go into operation.

General work is expected to start tomorrow night, and full operations will be continued within the next twenty-four hours, it was estimated last night.

Over six hundred men were affected by the enforced lay-off since last Wednesday morning, and the entire river workings were idle for that length of time. No appreciable property damage was recorded, the only loss due to the high water being the time lost from the job.

TAX REFUND IS REFUSED

Climaxing a long series of disputes between the Six Companies, Inc., and the state of Nevada, H. S. Pohn, chief clerk of the state tax commission refused to allow a large gasoline tax refund requested by the contractors on the grounds that the gasoline was not used on the highways of the state, but for industrial purposes.

PARKING LAWS MADE FOR B. C. MOTORISTS; MUST USE SPECIAL ZONES LAID OUT FOR PURPOSE

Planning to relieve the traffic congestion that has already become apparent in Boulder City, Chief of Police Bodell yesterday issued a parking ban in the restricted area, effective at once, and limiting parking in the downtown area to the large parking lot that has been provided by the Six Companies.

The notice issued by Bodell is dated at Boulder City, February 15, and reads:

"Beginning today, Chief Bodell has issued orders to reservation officers, to have any car found parked in the restricted area, towed in and impounded. Cars will not be released to owners until towing charges have been paid.

"The restricted area consists of the business section of the city, spaces between and surrounding dormitories.

"The Six Companies have gone to considerable expense in leveling off and lighting a free parking lot for reservation employees and owners have been repeatedly warned against the practice of all night parking of privately owned automobiles in the business section on paved streets and territory surrounding dormitories.

"Those people who are living in Six Companies houses have been given permission to park temporarily at their respective dwellings.

"The restricted area also comprises the lot on which the Six Companies garage is situated and area adjacent thereto. The regular parking lot has been established west of the rail road between Fir and Elm streets.

"This notice will serve as final warning and excuses for violations will no longer be accepted."

EXPLORERS IN CHINA END JOURNEY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15. (U.P.)—Wild, bandit-infested regions of Asia which have been visited but little since the day of Marco Polo were explored by the Circon-Haardt expedition, now in Peiping after a hazardous journey of 8,000 miles.

Arrival of the expedition in Peiping was announced today by the National Geographic society. The expedition set out from Beyrouth, Syria, on April 4, 1931. In almost a year of travel by slow stages, its members encountered temperatures ranging from 16 de-

The 30 members of the expedition traveled by motor, tractor-bands being substituted for wheels. For more than 700 miles on the last part of the journey the cars paralleled the crumbling ramparts of the great wall of China. The age-old caravan route was followed. In the section between Liangchowfu and Ninsiafu, China's "wild west," it required more than six days to travel 300 miles.

Scientists accompanying the expedition obtained a photographic record of life, customs and occupations of the tribes in the remote regions. Data and sketches of great educational value were obtained, the National Geographic reported.

The Missouri School of Mines at Rolla recently celebrated the sixtieth anniversary of its founding.
