quent encounters with bandits. The bandits' activities were limited mostly to stealing of supplies and equipment, but because of unsettled conditions in China the expedition was in constant appre-

The 30 members of the expedition traveled by motor, tractorbands being substituted for wheels. For more than 700 miles on the last part of the journey the cars paralleled the crumbling ramparts f the great wall of China. The age-old caravan route was followed. In the section between Liangchowfu and Ninsiafu, China's 'wild west," it required more than six days to travel 300 miles.

Scientists accompanying the expedition obtained a photographic record of life, customs and occupations of the tribes in the remote regions. Data and sketches of great educational value were btained, the National Geographic
