KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 16. (U.P.)—Cattle, hogs and sheep all advanced today on the Kansas City livestock market, with receipts light. Steers and yearlings were up 25 cents, with the bulk of sales ranging from \$4.50 to \$8. Top fat hogs brought \$3.90, and the bulk of sales ranged from \$3.70 to \$3.85. Lambs were 25 to 35 cents higher, ranging from \$5.50 to \$6.25.

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MRS. WATTS TO OPEN HOTEL HERE

Expanding to larger quarters for the third time in four months, Mrs. Watts' dining room, now located at the corner of Fremont and Fifth streets, is moving tomorrow to the building formerly occupied by the Ferguson-Balcom hospital, at 325 south Second street.

The new establishment will be known as Mrs. Watts' American Plan Hotel. It has been completely renovated and redecored, a crew of workmen spending several days shifting partitions and painting.

Eighty rooms in the building, and a small cottage with two rooms, will be available. Two dining rooms will be opened tomorrow, and in warmer weather, a long, shady porch will be screened and meals served there. Kitchen facilities are said to be excellent.

Among the many features of this roomy building are steam heat, electric closets, spacious windows, abundant shade trees, and an attractive lounging and smoking room.

The move, according to Mrs. Addie L. Watts, is being made to accommodate her expanding business. At her present location, she has rented several rooms and has built up a patronage which needs more space. Her meals feature southern style cooking.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Feb. 12. (U.P.)—Two hi-jackers shot and wounded two policemen tonight, robbed an automobile supply company of \$500 and escaped.

The bandits, after wounding Detective A. C. Tower and Emergency Officer R. H. Burks, were reported fleeing to Dallas, 30 miles away.

Burks was in a serious condition, shot through the groin.

ORDINANCE NO. 185 An ordinance to amend, revise, and re-enact Sections Nos. 2, 8 and 10 of Ordinance No. 111 of the City of Las Vegas, entitled, "An ordinance prohibiting the manufacture, storage or keeping, sale, offering or exposing for sale, barter, or other disposal of intoxicating liquors in the City of Las Vegas, regulating other matters pertaining thereto; providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance, and repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict therewith."

Section 1. Section 2 of said Ordinance No. 111, as amended by Section 1 of Ordinance No. 179 of the City of Las Vegas, is hereby amended, revised and re-enacted so that the same shall read as follows:

"Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to manufacture, keep or store, sell, offer or expose for sale or barter, or otherwise dispose of, except as hereinafter provided, any intoxicating liquors in the City of Las Vegas; provided, that nothing in this ordinance shall prohibit the manufacture, sale, keeping or storing of said liquors where the manufacture, sale, keeping or storing of the same is permitted by the laws of the State of Nevada or of the United States of America."

Section 2. Section 8 of said Ordinance No. 111, as amended by Section 2 of Ordinance No. 179 of the City of Las Vegas, is hereby amended, revised and re-enacted so that the same shall read as follows:

"Section 8. It shall be unlawful for any person to have upon his person or in any vehicle, any intoxicating liquors on any public street or alley, or in any public place in the City of Las Vegas."

Section 3. Section 10 of said Ordinance No. 111, as amended by Section 3 of Ordinance No. 179 of the City of Las Vegas, is hereby amended, revised and re-enacted so that the same shall read as follows:

"Section 10. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) nor more than Four Hundred Ninety-nine Dollars (\$499.00), or be

SENATE Received nomination of Benjamin Nathan Cardozo of New York to succeed Oliver Wendell Holmes as supreme court jurist.

Judiciary committee voted to recommend the public printing of a report by the Wickersham commission experts condemning the action of authorities in the Mooney-Billings case.

Judiciary committee asked Attorney General Mitchell to submit a written report to the senate on the status of radio anti-trust suits.

A telegram from Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt stating it was the government's duty to allay distress and starvation was placed into the record by Senator Wagner, Dem., N. Y.

Walter S. Schmidt of Cincinnati, O., told a sub-committee a federal home loan bank system would remedy conditions under which mortgage money has practically disappeared.

Agriculture committee reported favorably the Jones bill establishing a \$10,000,000 revolving fund which could be used to advance loans to local agricultural credit corporations.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 15. (U.P.)—While the stock market returned to slow, narrow movements today, United States government bonds took the spotlight and advanced as sensationally as stocks did late last week.

Their rise was hailed as evidence of the noninflationary tendencies of the new Glass-Steagall bill to expand credit. It was argued that investors were convinced the new bill would greatly aid rather than work against fixed interest-bearing securities.

In the share market, prices ruled steady fractions to 4 points under the previous close where they were driven by normal profit-taking in the early trading. The opening was irregular and then came heavy selling that caused tickers to lag behind 3 minutes. Before the end of the first hour the tape caught up and volume fell precipitately.

Grains declined and closed lower for the day. Cotton held about steady. Other share markets followed the issue on the big board.

Ability of the list to withstand the profit-taking was favorably interpreted. Strong arm methods were seen in the loan market for stocks, where the premium on American Telephone was jacked up to 25 cents a share. This method was used recently to stem shorts eager to sell U. S. Steel.

Sales for the day totaled only 2,000,000 shares, against 2,600,000 on both last Thursday and Saturday.

News of the day included omission of four copper company dividends—International Nickel, Utah, Nevada and Kennecott. This brought copper shares down after they had ruled firm on higher prices for the metal.

Du Pont declared the regular dividend in line with expectations. Custing the Wall street management of Transamerica corporation in favor of A. P. Giannini, spectacular coast banker, sent Transamerica stock up to 4 1/2, up 3/4, where it closed the day.

United States Steel today opened unchanged at 49, dipped to 46 1/2, and then rallied, closing at 47 1/2, off 1 1/2 points for the day.

Other closing prices included American Telephone 128 1/2, off 4 1/2; Westinghouse Electric 29 1/2, off 2 1/2; Du Pont 55 1/2, off 1 1/2; Auburn 119 1/2, off 4 1/2; New York Central 31 1/2, off 1 1/2; Atchison 84 1/2, off 2 1/2; Union Pacific 86 1/2, off 2 1/2; Consolidated Gas 62 1/2, off 2 1/2.

The Dow-Jones industrial average touched 80.88 and then rallied to close at 82.18 off 3.64 from the previous close. The railroad average touched 80.88 and then rallied the utility average at 33.96, off 0.91.
