## DEMPSEY KO'S **OPPONENTS** OUICKLY

(United Press Staff Correspondent) FLINT AUDITORIUM, Mich., Feb. 15. (U.P.)-Jack Dempsey was in action less than one round here tonight, knocking out two opponents with a vicious attack which brought wild acclaim from the capacity crowd of 7,000. The receipts were about \$11,000, of which Dempsey recaived 50 per cent.

Fighting the 80th and 81st bouts Dempsey knocked out George Kohler. cago, in 61 seconds and Pat Mc-Laughlin, Waupaca, Wis., in 1 minute, 12 seconds. They were the 26th and 27th knockouts of his tour, and made it three in a row as he stopped Meyer (K. O.) Christner, Akron, O., veteran, in Cleveland last Thursday night.

Dempsey weighed 194, Kohler 190, and McLaughlin 196. Ten cunce gloves were used by all three of

Dempsey left soon after the bouts for Chicago, where he meets King Levinsky, Chicago heavyweight, in a scheduled 4 round bout Thursday

Two left hooks to the head spelled disaster for Kohler, lanky heavyweight who seemed frightened from the time he entered the ring. The first left hook sent Kohler spinning backward and Dempsey, leaping in for the kill, ripped another to the jaw. Kohler dropped to the canvas, and was counted out. Kohler's cheek was a vivid crimson from Dempsey's

The next bout started as soon as Kohler was revived and left the ring. McLaughlin, who looked in much better shape than Kohler, started right after Dempsey, but a left hook slowed him up in the first few seconds of fighting. Another left hook dropped McLaughlin to the canvas for a count of three. He got up groggy, and attempted to put his mouth piece back into prace. Denipsev allowed him to get it back in place before hitting him again.

A series of rights and lefts to the nead made McLaughlin's knees buckle, but Dempsey grabbed him under the arms to prevent him from going down after holding him for a few seconds. Dempsey came out of the clinch and then let loose with a two fisted attack which dropped McLaughlin unconscious on the canvas. The referee did not even bother to count out McLaughlin, who had to be carried to his corner.
