

BOULDER CITY And News of The Hoover Dam Project

CREWSHARD AT WORK CLEARING TUNNEL; ANOTHER TEMPORARY BRIDGE BEING PUT IN POSITION

Larger groups of men are being put to work each day in the tunnel workings on the Hoover dam as the Six Companies again swing into construction work after their enforced layoff due to the recent high water in the Colorado.

Crews have already been at work erecting another temporary bridge to replace the one that was washed away at the upper portal.

Other forces of men have been added from day to day to augment the workers who have been engaged in cleaning out the tunnels preparatory to recommencing the excavation work. In the tunnels where the water had free flow from one end to the other, large amounts of mud and silt were deposited by the rushing waters, and much of this was allowed to wash out with the receding waters, leaving, however, a considerable quantity to be cleaned out by the contractor's crews.

Practically all of this silt must be cleaned out of the tunnels, especially in the headings of the two tunnels not yet holed through, before the drilling crews will have secure enough footing to work safely.

Large pumps have been working 24 hours a day for the past four days, lowering the water behind the barriers that have been erected before the tunnel mouths, due to the fact that the Colorado is still several feet above normal level.

With the aid of the pumps, it has been possible to start work much sooner than would have been the case otherwise.

It is estimated that full crews will be back on the regular three-shift basis within the next few days, and progress on the tunnels will again be back to normal.

Plans are under way for the formation of a Boy Scout group in Boulder City, and a meeting will soon be arranged for all boys of 12 years and older who wish to join the nationwide movement.

When they have become first class Scouts, they are eligible to work for merit badges in hundreds of special lines of endeavor appearing before the local court of honor for their awards.

Boulder City boys are especially fortunate if they join the Boy Scout organization, as they are in the midst of the world's greatest engineering undertaking, and can study its many phases as part of their Scout work.

BEARS' ACTION BOOSTS STOCK

NEW YORK, Feb. 18. (UP)—The New York stock exchange today took another step to curb short selling, its latest edict seen as practically eliminating bear operations on a large scale.

The new ruling provides that brokers must obtain permission from their clients before lending the clients' stock for short selling purposes. At the present time each client of a broker signs a blanket agreement giving the broker the right to lend the stock so held.

A resolution adopted by the governing committee today making this provision is effective on April 1. This gives the present short interest about 5 weeks to cover its commitments or make special arrangements to continue the loans of stock.

Bears had some inkling of what was coming before the close in New York. They covered feverishly in the last few minutes of trading and sent prices sharply higher. When the market closed here, the shorts continued to cover in the San Francisco market, where America's favorite shares were bid up to new high levels for the year.

S. F. ISSUES SHOW SPURTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 18. (UP)—New highs for the year were registered in leading stocks on both the San Francisco stock and curb exchanges today.

The close on leading issues was above today's New York close.

Short covering from New York, financial center reports said, was responsible for the advance.

On the curb here American Tel. & Tel. closed at 137 1/2, compared to a New York close of 133 1/2. Bethlehem Steel, which closed in New York at 22 1/2, closed here at 23 1/2. U. S. Steel closed here at 52 1/2, compared to the New York close of 49 1/2. Volume here was 5,830 shares. General Motors closed on the local curb at 24 1/2, compared to the New York close of 23 1/2.

GARNER BOOM IS UNDER WAY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18. (UP)—John N. Garner, Texas rancher and speaker of the house of representatives, was formally advanced tonight as a Democratic candidate for President by the two Texas senators.

Senators Morris Sheppard and Tom Connally in a statement announced the Texas delegation to the Democratic national convention in June will present Garner's name for the presidential nomination and the delegation will be instructed to vote for him.

"Mere mention" of Garner's name aroused "spontaneous enthusiasm and support in many sections of the country," the statement said, and predicted this candidacy would "continue to grow in strength as his services and character become more intimately known to the Democrats of the nation."
