

CATS' SECOND STRING DOWNS NEEDLES QUINT IN UNEXCITING CLASH

Star Men Given Rest For Tonight's Contest

In an unexciting and slow tilt last night, the Wildcat second string put the Needles basketball quintet down a peg by defeating them with a 25-15 score.

The second string started the game and played the entire first half which ended 16-10 in favor of the locals. The first squad took the floor in the second half, and although playing a better defensive game, failed to score as many points as their team-mates. The Wildcats scored 9 points in the second half to their opponents' 5.

The first half of the game was well marked with fouls, both teams having a good share, but failing to score many points on their chances.

The Wildcat first squad failed to click as well as they have in other games here, but were not putting any too great effort into their playing, which will probably prove beneficial in tonight's game with Tonopah.

The starting lineup for the Wildcats was: Dunnigan, center; McKenzie and Ward forwards; Jarrett and Croal, guards. Croal and Ward tied for high point scores for the locals with 5 points each. The starting lineup in the second half was: Kay and Stewart, forwards; Speer and Foremaster, guards; and Willetts at center. Speer led this group in scoring with 4 points.

A real fight is promised for the fans tonight with the greatest basketball rival of the locals, Tonopah, meeting them in their return game. The northerners defeated the Wildcats at Tonopah at the first of the season by several points and the Wildcats, with a much improved squad, are out to even up the score.

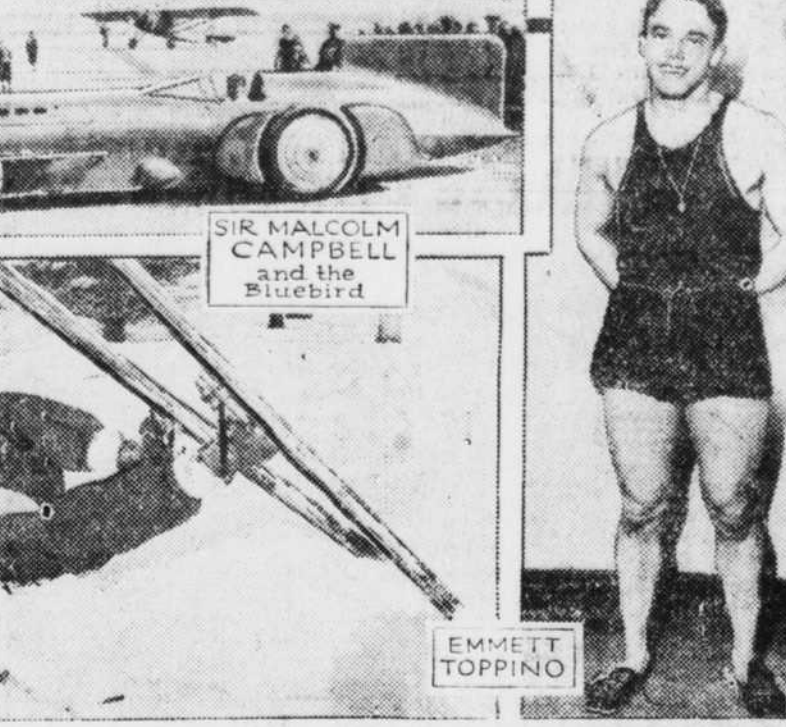

DEMPSEY TO CONTINUE, DESPITE FLOP

CHICAGO, Feb. 19. (AP)—Jack Dempsey has no intention of abandoning his plans for attempting a comeback this summer because he lost a newspaper decision to King Levinsky, the former heavyweight champion announced today through his manager, Leonard Sacks.

Dempsey said he will continue his present tour until some time in April, lay off for a month and then establish a training camp where he can train for six weeks or two months without interruption.

ARE SATISFIED

"Dempsey and myself are satisfied with his condition to date," said Sacks' formal statement. "Dempsey has had a lot of extra work shoved on him during the tour and it is not humanly possible for him to satisfy the public as he has been attempting to do by participating in outside functions and then giving his best in the ring."

"He has been eating different sorts of food, sleeping in a strange bed every other night, riding railroad trains, and shaking hands with thousands of well-wishers. This has been quite a strain on him."

"Unfortunately for Dempsey he made his poorest showing before the largest crowd that has turned out to see him on his tour. I don't want to take any credit away from Levinsky. He is aggressive and a dangerous puncher, and is decidedly a heavyweight contender. Three or four more opponents of the calibre of Levinsky is what Dempsey needs to tighten him up."

OFF FORM

The unexpected drop in Dempsey's weight from 194 pounds on Monday to 190 pounds on Thursday tends to indicate that Jack was slightly off form. He weighed 194½ at Milwaukee ten days ago, 185 at Cleveland a week ago and 194 at Flint three days ago. Dempsey's weight for some of his important fights follow: Willard, 187; Carpenter, 188; Firpo, 192½; Sharkey, 194½; second Tunney bout, 192.

Although the poll of newspaper men gave Levinsky 18 votes, Dempsey 2, with 4 voting for a draw. Referee Ed Purdy said today that this vote did not indicate how close the bout was.

"I thought Levinsky had a shade," said Purdy, "but it was mighty close. Dempsey landed a lot of telling punches about the body and I think his showing was wonderful for a man who has been idle for 4½ years. I have refereed several of Levinsky's fights and he never set a faster pace than he did against Dempsey. I don't think any man is

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Feb. 19. (AP)—Two Norwegian speed skaters, flashing over the ice against the stop watch, won the world's titles in the 500 and 5,000 meter events in the world championship speed skating races which opened today.

Haakon Pedersen of Norway sped through the 500 distance in 44.4 seconds, and his countryman, Ivar Ballangrud finished the 5,000 meters in 8 minutes, 37.6 seconds, more than a minute better than Irving Jaffee's time in the Olympic event, which Jaffee won with 9 minutes, 40.8 seconds.
