Manchurian Republic Not Recognized By China

Roots in charge of our missions in China, reports all missionaries safe.

BERLIN, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—The foreign office today asked the Hamburg American line and the North German Lloyd line to send ships to Shanghai to evacuate German residents.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—A united front in dealing with the far eastern situation has been achieved at last by the United States, Great Britain, France and Italy.

The representations, combined with an 11th hour appeal to preserve the peace, were made to the Japanese minister at Shanghai on the eve of the battle now raging there.

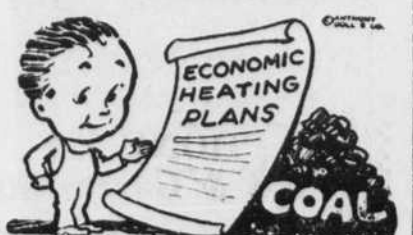
Concurrently, military representatives of the four nations protested to Gen. Tsai Ping-Kai, Chinese commander, against shelling of the Yangtze Poo district which endangered foreign lives.

BORAH SEES WAR
WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee tonight saw war between this country and Japan lurking behind proposals for an economic boycott.

The senate irreconcilable leader counseled the administration not to listen to the growing mass of appeals for an economic thrust against Japan.

JAPANESE VOTE
TOKIO, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Japanese voters went to the polls today, more interested in the fighting at Shanghai than in balloting. Tonight a victory for Premier Tsuyoshi Inukai's government party was certain, although returns were not immediately available.

The election at which 466 seats in the new Teikoku Gikai, (lower house of parliament) were filled, coincided with the beginning of the Japanese offensive at Shanghai. The voting was heavy but orderly.

DIAMOND FANS SCAN MAJOR CAMPS

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—The critical eyes of the nation's baseball fans turned today toward major league training camps in the south and west, where preparations for the 1932 season are already under way.

The vanguard of six clubs were rolling toward training camps tonight. They were the Brooklyn Robins, Philadelphia Athletics, Washington Senators, St. Louis Cardinals and Cincinnati Reds.

Three baseball crews are already encamped in California, the Giants at Los Angeles, the Detroit Tigers at Chico and the Pittsburgh Pirates' batterymen at Paso Robles. Within the next week all of the 16 major league clubs are expected to have players in camp or enroute to them. Major league club owners are

singularly free of "holdouts" this season. Only four important players are definitely considered holdouts. And each of the four is expected to sign his contract at about the management's figure.

Dabe Ruth, of course, heads the list. He wants \$80,000 for one year, or a two-year contract at the rate of \$70,000. The Yankees, it is understood, want to sign him on a one year basis at the latter figure. Since the Yankees have had at least \$10,000 worth of advertising with this almost yearly salary argument, it's possible Ruth will have his way.

Chick Hafey, St. Louis Cardinals outfielder, is another problem. He is willing to accept the \$12,500 contract offered, but wants the \$2,000 he says was held out in his 1931 salary for having reported tardily.

Babe Herman, Brooklyn Dodgers fielder, is also unsigned. He was offered a contract at a rate reduced from that of 1931. Herman is expected to sign soon. The fourth holdout is Dazzy Vance, another Brooklynite, whose salary was cut from \$25,000 to \$22,000 last year. He's been offered \$12,000 for the 1932 season and insists he won't sign for less than \$15,000. Brooklyn fans expect
