river bridge and Bunkerville. It runs through rough country cut by many water courses. It winds and twists and dips and seeks the line of least resistance because in the days it was built funds were scarcer than at present.

So they are cutting straight through the rough country, eliminating both curves and grades. The engineers are cutting sixty feet deep through hills and making fifty feet high and one hundred and seventy feet wide at the base.
