## Six Months Of Seething Life On Boulder Reserve—And No Major Crime, That's Marshals' Record

### Rangers and Police in Cooperation Handle Big Crowds

Six months of police work—and not a major crime committed in the world's largest construction camp during all that time. That is the record hung up by the Boulder City police and the Reservation rangers, under the leadership of Chief Glen E. "Bud" Bogell and Claude Williams. Yesterday morning the swarming crowds attending the celebration of Washington's birthday were directed by the combined efforts of the two forces, on the day that marked the sixth month of their control of the reservation. Not a single traffic accident was reported, and the absence of any confusion during the handling of the crowds showed the remarkable efficiency attained by the two forces, composed entirely of deputy U. S. marshals.

## BOULDER BOOTLEG EXPLODES AND SETS 'SALOON' ON FIRE

Raiding a shack east of the New Mexico Construction company's camp for the third time, Boulder City police found a quantity of liquor and arrested two men suspected of bootlegging on the reservation, late Saturday night. Police surrounded the shack, which had been under observation for some days, and entered through both front and rear doors simultaneously, arresting J. T. Webb and J. McCafferty, charging them with illegal possession of liquor. Destroying all of the whiskey seized with the exception of a small quantity for evidence, one of the officers knocked the bottle against the stove. The liquid exploded and set the shack on fire, a mute testimonial to the quality of the bootleg. The two men arrested were taken to Las Vegas to be held for their arraignment before U. S. Commissioner W. J. Flowers.

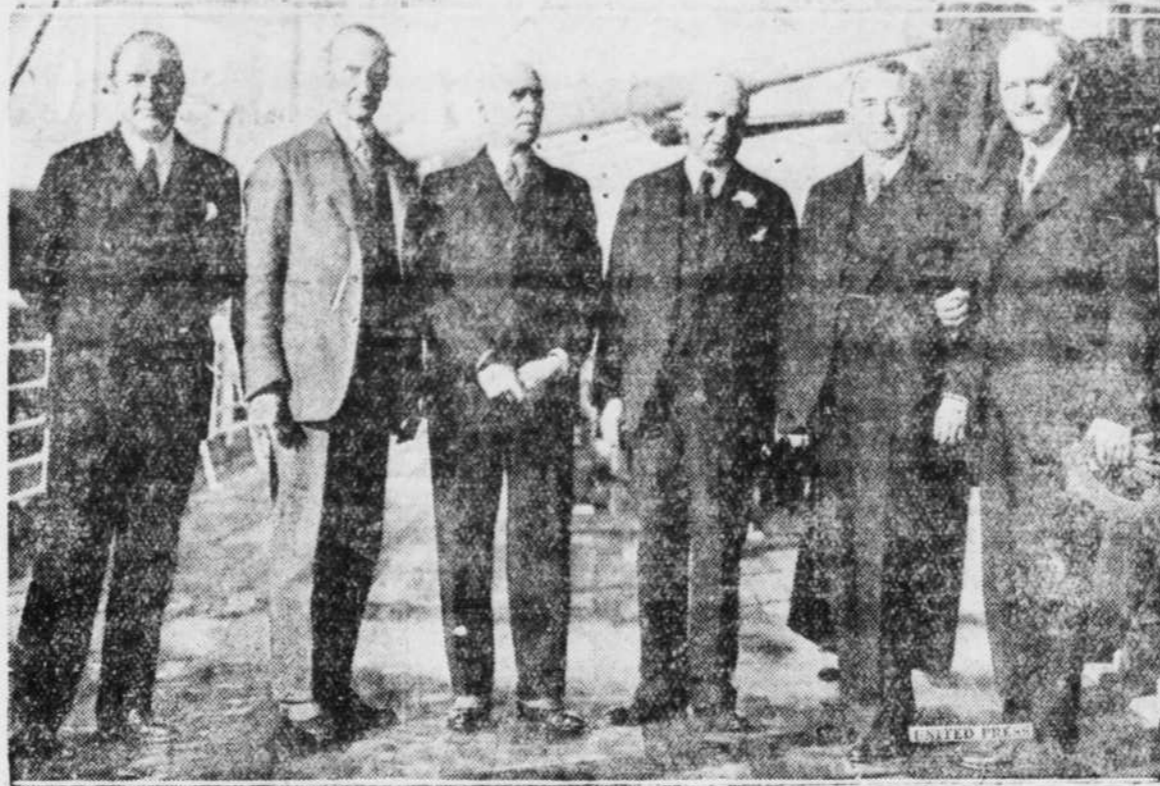
**RESUMES SCHOOL WORK**
