## CATS MEET STRONGEST TEAM HERE TONIGHT IN BUNKERVILLE CONTEST

Star Center of Valley  
Team Seen as Big  
Threat

Meeting Bunkerville tonight in a return game, the Wildcats are up against their toughest opponents. The Bunkerville squad is a strong, fast team, built around their six foot three inch center, Neagle. Neagle has scored from 15 to 30 points in almost every game the valley men have played this year and his basket shooting is uncannily accurate.

When the Wildcats met Bunkerville there they succeeded in holding Neagle down to a few points in the first half, but he broke loose in the second and scored 14 points to win the game.

The Tonopah squad placed two guards on the Bunkerville team and succeeded in holding him, but the guards were forced out on fouls late in the game and with just a few minutes to play he sank enough shots to overcome the Muckers' lead by 14 points and win the game.

If the locals can play as good a game tonight as they did against Tonopah last week they should have little trouble with Bunkerville. The big threat of the Tonopah squad was Nowling, and Stewart succeeded in holding him down to 11 points, giving the Wildcats the game. If Coach Dashiell can put a man as effective as Stewart on Neagle, the locals will not have to worry about him. Stewart, however, is no match for the Bunkerville star as he lacks the height to stop him. There are several other men on the squad in Foremaster, Kay, and Speer who can stop him if they play the kind of a game they have proven themselves able to play.

Foremaster is the likely man as he is plenty fast and tall. The Wildcats have won their last five games and have not been defeated on their home floor this year. They will be very hard for any of the conference teams to stop.

The game with Bunkerville tonight and that with Ely tomorrow night are the last home games this year, and these games will probably determine the southern representative to the state tournament.

The Wildcats will play at Overton Saturday night to finish up a schedule of five games in eight days.

## HEAVIES TO BE AT CARD; ONLY TWO TO BATTLE

CHICAGO, Feb. 23. (U.P.)—Five of the leading heavyweights will be in the Chicago stadium Friday night. Ernie Schiff, Boston, will meet W. L. "Young" Stribling in a 10-round bout, and Jack Dempsey, Jack Sharkey and Mickey Walker will be spectators.

Sidney Strotz, who was re-elected president of the stadium at a board of directors meeting today, said his organization was willing to meet or better any offer made for Dempsey's services.

## MAY ADD THREE NEW DIVISIONS TO OLYMPIC TEST

NEW YORK, Feb. 23. (U.P.)—The addition of three sectional Olympic track and field tryouts will be recommended to the American Olympic committee when it meets here March 6, the track and field committee decided today.

The committee will propose that eleven sectionals be held instead of the eight originally proposed.

The new sectionals proposed and the territory they will embrace, follow:

Pacific—at San Francisco—Northern California, Nevada, Hawaii and Philippine Islands.

Central—Detroit—Illinois, Indiana, Michigan.

Gulf—at Houston—Texas.

The other eight sectional tryouts have been proposed for Portland, Ore., Los Angeles, Denver, Iowa City, New Orleans, Atlanta, Cincinnati and Cambridge, Mass.
