## ANDERSON BOARDING HOUSE CLINGS TO STEEP CLIFF NEAR HOOVER DAM RIVER WORKINGS

### Ultra - Modern Plant Unique In Its Location

To most of the Washington's birthday visitors who were escorted through the great Hoover dam project last Monday, the Anderson Brothers Supply company camp, which clings to the side of one of the rocky cliffs which tower almost a thousand feet above the treacherous Colorado, is just one of the several buildings at the dam site.

But to those who sought a more detailed mental picture of the project in its entirety, that same building, a two story structure, houses a large recreation hall, barber shop, soda fountain, cigar and news stand, all on the upper floor, reached by a stairway built on the side of the cliff.

The lower floor contains a large dining hall and kitchen. On entering the hall the first things that attract the eye are the long orderly rows of tables, newly decorated walls and the general air of cleanliness that prevails. On entering the kitchen one finds steel top work tables, electric griddles, an electric vegetable washer, steam tables, a large electric bake oven, a bread slicing machine and other modern culinary devices. Meats are kept at a temperature of 35 degrees in a large thermostatically controlled ice box. An ice machine that manufactures 1,000 pounds of ice daily is another interesting feature.

All cakes and pastries which are part of the daily menu are home baked. Ventilation is kept as near perfect as possible by air conditioning, which includes washing and cooling.

Twelve hundred wholesome, satisfying meals are served daily.
