MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By RICHARD L. GRIDLEY (United Press Financial Writer)

NEW YORK, Feb. 24, (U.P.)—The stock market regained its equilibrium after a weak first hour today and managed to regain much of the ground lost in yesterday's selling wave.

Good gains were made in various speculative favorites and signs of new pool operations were discernible in a variety of special issues, which have met good buying recently.

Auburn Auto, which led yesterday's decline, retraced about half its dozen-point decline of the preceding session, rising above the \$100 mark.

Pivotal shares like United States Steel, American Telephone, General Motors, American Can and Allied Chemical rose to gains of one to three points and held most of the improvement to the close.

A few weak spots cropped out, notably National Surety, which fell nearly four points on postponement of the dividend, previously paid at the rate of \$2 annually.

Other important downward dividend revisions had comparatively little effect on the shares involved. Most important on American Bank Note common, Atlantic Gulf & West India preferred and the Worthington Pump preferred issues.

Traders continued to worry about the outcome of the General Electric meeting scheduled for March 4, at which time consideration will be given the common dividend of 40 cents a share due to be declared at that time.

Many look for a reduction. Issues in which special buying was noted today were Brooklyn-Manhattan Transit, American Wool preferred, Radio Corporation, the Dairy Issues, Loew's Inc., and McKeesport Tin Plate. Strength in B. M. T. reflected in part the company's showing for the seven months ended January 31 when it earned \$4.28 a common share against \$4.30 a share in the preceding seven months.

Coppers improved late in the session despite continued weakness in the price of the metal, while shares of companies operating in the farm belt were helped by a late rally in both the grain and cotton markets.

Not light was shed on the metal situation by President Cornish of National Lead, who stated that this year was "the worst" he had seen. He added, however, that in his opinion National Lead's three stock issues were selling far below "their worth."

Business news of the day showed a continuation of the irregular movement that has been apparent since the January seasonal upswing reached its peak. Steel authorities saw no indication yet of the effects of the government's various economic aid proposals.

Iron Age reporting a drop in steel ingot output last week to 26 per cent of capacity, against 27 per cent a week before. Car loadings showed a further decline from the preceding week.

Rails were firm throughout the session, however, influenced in part by the special meeting of the Railroad Credit corporation this afternoon at which loan applications for several roads were acted upon. Among the roads understood to have asked and obtained assistance was the St. Louis-San Francisco railway, which has maturities to meet on March 1. At the conclusion of the meeting E. G. Buckland, president, said that no defaults in railroad bonds would take place on that date.
