

# WILDCATS TRAMPLE ON BUNKERVILLE QUINTET. DESPITE NEAGLE THREAT

### Clash With Bobcats of Ely Tonight; Meet Overton Soon

The bright star of the Virgin Valley basketball team failed to shine last night when the Wildcats of the local high school trampled the Bunkerville squad by a 27-16 count.

Captain Foremaster, guard, led the locals to victory in the fastest game that has been played here in years, leading the scoring with ten points, two fouls and four long field goals. Foremaster's performance last night was up to any that he has ever played and his long shots were as accurate as any could be.

Speer, who plays on the other guard, turned in one of his best games last night, and was playing over the heads of the Bunkerville squad until he was taken out in the last quarter on fouls. Speer scored five points on short fast shots that he made from the side of the basket.

Stewart followed Foremaster in scoring with six points, all field goals, and though smaller than the other men on the floor, he stopped many scoring attempts and played all around his larger foes.

Willetts and Kay deserve a lot of credit for their playing in the game. Both were above their average and were responsible for a good many more points than they actually scored. Kay scored two points and Willetts four.

The Bunkerville squad was hard fighting and fast but were unable to keep up with the Wildcats. They threatened the locals only once after the first quarter, when in the last quarter they put on a burst of speed and scored six points before the Wildcats clamped down on them.

The score at the end of the first quarter stood 3-1 for Bunkerville but in the second period the local scored 11 points and held their opponents scoreless. At the end of the third quarter the score stood 19-8 and both teams scored eight points in the last quarter.

Neagle was either unable to get going or his ability was greatly exaggerated in reports from those opponents, for he failed to get loose and go on one of his scoring sprees. The Wildcats can be credited with keeping him so well guarded.

The Wildcats have taken their last six games and with Ely on the schedule here tonight and Overton Saturday, they stand in a good way to bring home the state crown.

**GRID TROPHY IS SHOWN IN VEGAS**

A "Point and Tackle" trophy to be donated to the Las Vegas high school by M. W. Davis, jeweler, has just been completed by his manufacturing department, and is now on display in his show window.

The trophy is in the form of a

full size silver football, and is engraved with the name of each player participating in each game with the number of points scored and tackles made in the individual games during last season.

Due to some of the high scores piled up by the Wildcats, almost two full panels of the four quarters of the ball are filled with engraving, there being more than 750 letters engraved in the surface of the ball.

A plan was followed of giving the lineup for each game, with the points scored by the player in the game set after his name, and a capital "T" for tackles.

**DEAD HEAT ENDS CALIENTE RACE**

The custom is to pool first and second money and divide, while bets on both horses pay off at fifty per cent.

**JACK DEMPSEY NOW COLONEL, KENTUCKY TYPE**

FRANKFORT, Ky., Feb. 24. (UP)—Jack Dempsey, former world's heavyweight champion fighter, today became Colonel Jack Dempsey, an aide de camp on the personal staff of Governor Ruby Laffoon of Kentucky. Gov. Laffoon commissioned Dempsey a full-fledged Kentucky colonel just after the fighter addressed the general assembly. Dempsey was the first prize fighter ever so honored.

It was the third time in Dempsey's colorful history that he had stood before a state legislative body and addressed the legislators. Several years ago he accepted an invitation to speak to the Wisconsin senate and before that he spoke, by invitation, to the Michigan assembly. As in his previous similar experiences, the one time "Manassa mauler" appeared perfectly at ease as he spoke today to the statesmen.

If Schaaf, who is now ranked No. 4 by the National Boxing association, wins impressively from Stribling, ranked No. 5, he will not only add to his own prestige but will take some of the glamour away from Schmeling's reputation, based largely on his technical knockout of Stribling in the 15th round last July.
