NEW RECREATION HALL NEARS COMPLETION AT BOULDER CITY

Rapidly nearing completion, John J. Laubach's new recreation hall will soon be open for the entertainment of Boulder City citizens, and will be one of the show places of the Dam city.

For the cue experts, near experts, and would-be experts, the new recreation hall will offer ample facilities for practice and competition in their favorite games, for eight pool and billiard tables are even now being set up and leveled, and will soon be ready for play. Followers of the fine old English game of snooker will also have two tables of their own upon which to demonstrate their skill.

Other features of the 50 by 75 foot recreation hall will be a large and completely up-to-date soda and lunch fountain, at which all kinds of cooling drinks will be served, in addition to featuring light lunches and sandwiches.

Large cigar and candy counters will also be installed for the convenience of the patrons, and merchandise to suit every taste will be kept fresh and tasty at all times. Both departments will feature the most complete lines of such merchandise in Boulder City.

But recently completed, the new building is large and well lighted, and will have one of the best ventilating systems in the Dam city. The building is of concrete block construction, and complies in every way with the building code established by the government for Boulder City business buildings.

Featuring as it will, many different types of recreation, the Laubach recreation hall bids fair to become a central gathering place for Boulder City workmen.
