

# MAYOR BLOCKS CAMPBELL TRIALS

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Feb. 25. (U.P.)—After a heated argument today between Captain Sir Malcolm Campbell and Mayor E. N. Armstrong of Daytona Beach, the British record holder's proposed attempt to shatter six automobile speed marks was postponed until tomorrow.

"It's a bloody shame!" shouted the lean, hawk-faced English speedster, pounding upon the hood of his supercar Bluebird, when the mayor positively refused to permit runs today because rains had made the beach heavy.

"We will not permit you to risk your life on that beach today, and that's all there is to it," the mayor repeated hotly. "Now we might just as well be nice about it."

The argument occurred in the garage where the 1500-horsepower Napier Bluebird is housed. Campbell insisted that everything was "right" for the attempt and that even though the beach was a little heavy it would not stop him from setting new records. But Armstrong was equally insistent that the city of Daytona Beach was responsible for the Britisher's welfare and would permit no "daredevil" shots.

Campbell implored the city head to let him take the 24-foot racing car down to the beach, at least for a trial run.

"You started on a trial run yesterday," Armstrong retorted, "and made 267 miles an hour. I know how you feel, but there's really nothing we can do about it, but to

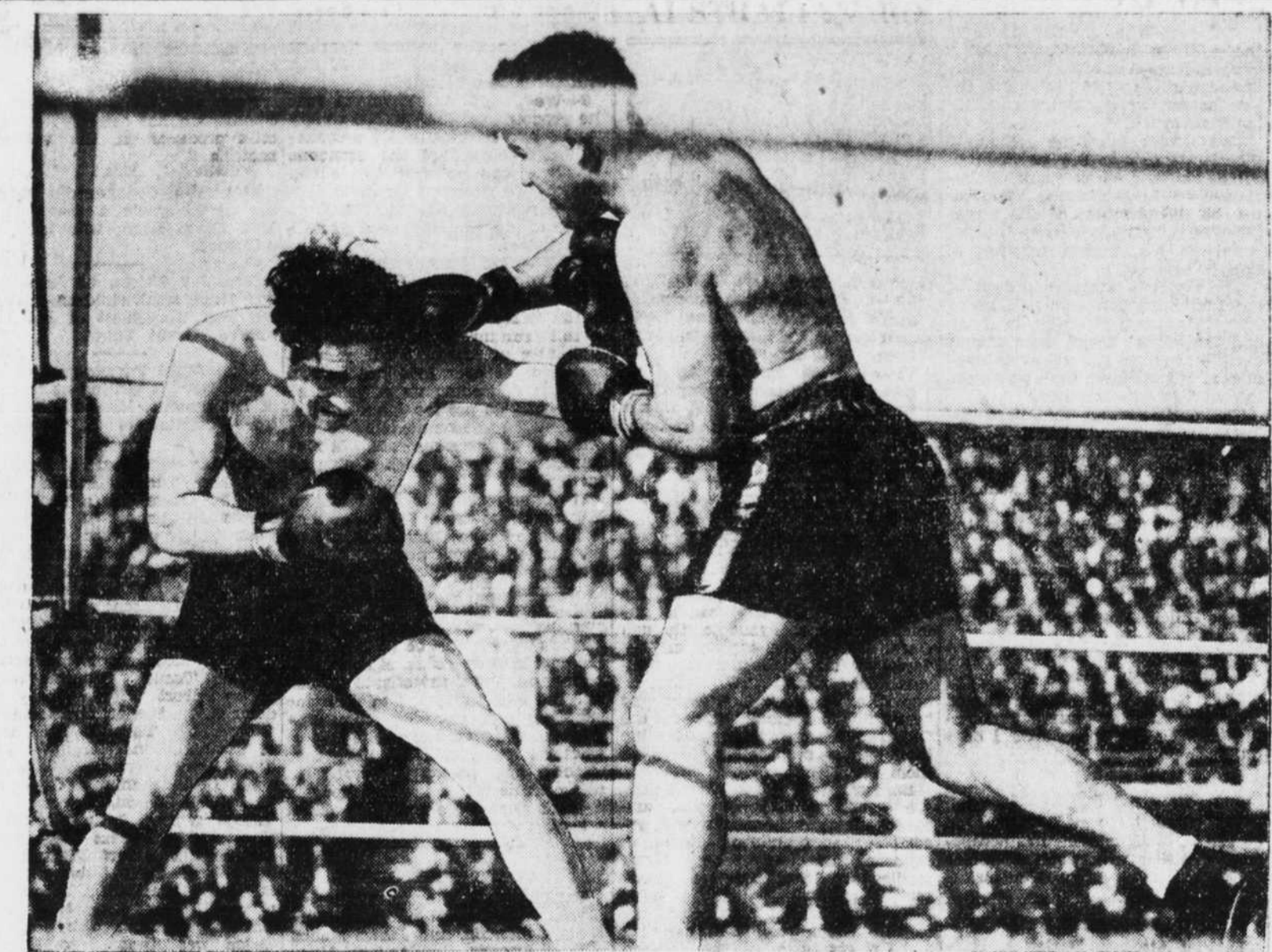

## N. B. A. BOUTS TO BE HEAVY PARTY

By GEORGE KIRKSEY (United Press Staff Correspondent) CHICAGO, Feb. 25. (U.P.)—A national convention of heavyweights will be held in the Chicago stadium Friday when Ernie Schaaf of Boston meets W. L. (Young) Stribling of Georgia in a scheduled 10-round bout.

With Schaaf and Stribling battling for fourth position in the N. B. A.'s heavyweight rankings, Jack Sharkey in Schaaf's corner, Jack Dempsey in a ringside seat, Jack Kearns representing Mickey Walker, Tuffy Griffiths in the audience and King Levinsky's scouts on hand, virtually every one of the leading contenders will be represented.

The only four prominent heavyweights who will not be represented are Max Schmeling, recognized in some quarters as champion; Primo Carnera; Tommy Loughran, and Larry Gains, the Canadian negro who holds a knockout over Schmeling. Schmeling, Carnera and Gains are in Europe and Loughran in Mexico City.

Schaaf, who is ranked No. 4 by the N. B. A., continued to rule a 7-5 favorite today over Stribling, ranked No. 5. Schaaf has rolled up 12 consecutive victories, ten of them by knockouts, since he engaged in a no-decision bout with Paul Pantaleo last March in Minneapolis.

## Visitors Outplay Cat Men Who Fail To Open Up

A last quarter spurt by the White Pine Bobcats in their hoop game with the Wildcats last night, sent them ahead to win the game from the locals by a 33-26 count.

The Wildcats played even ball with the Bobcats until in the last quarter the northerners rallied and swept past the locals to win the game. The Wildcats were visibly under a strain of their hard schedule of four games in the last week and were unable to keep up with their hard fighting opponents.

With a record of six straight victories the locals were in a good way to cop the southern state honors this year, and with a game at Ely yet to play, they may have a chance to come out ahead.

Last night's game was another leap in Ely's chance for the title. They have not been beaten this year. The Wildcats were beaten on their home floor for the first time this season.

Tomorrow night the Wildcats will play at Overton and an attempt is being made to schedule Panaca to play here Monday.

jail facilities are "badly" needed, or that county officers are suffering for lack of sufficient space to efficiently carry out their work.

4—We find further that all of the space available in the present county jail is not being used for jail purposes, and recommend that if additional cell-room is needed that this space be utilized for that purpose. We recommend further that the county make arrangements with the city to handle their petty criminals at the stockade, and if this is not practical that the county build a stockade of their own for this purpose.

5—We find further that the statutes of the state provide that no bonds can be sold at less than par or at an interest rate of more than six per cent. With these restrictions, bonds to finance the proposed construction could not be sold.

6—We find further that in all probability the county treasurer will be unable to collect all of the tax monies due in the second installment of 1931 taxes—that the percentage of delinquencies will run astonishingly high—which means that county income will be materially cut, necessitating much more rigid economy than at any previous time in our history, we therefore recommend the strictest economy in every governmental department of our county, city and schools.

7—We believe, however, that the present quarters, if used to capacity, are entirely adequate to take care of the more desperate criminals, and believe that any expenditure in this connection not exceed the sum of \$5,000.

8—We understand from reliable authorities that modern jail equipment, in first class condition, is available and can be purchased from
