So far as the Republicans are concerned, leaders said here today. there seems to be complete agreement that both Senator Tasker L Oddle and Representative S S Arentz again will be the unan:mous choice of the party to succeed themselves in the national congress. Both are avowed candidates and would seek reelection on their records.

Other senatorial prospects are Ed W. Clark, Las Vegas banker; Norman J. Barry, Reno attorney, H. R. Cooke, former Democratic state chairman; Charles L. Richards, defeated candidate for governor in 1929; Judge George S. Brown, university regent; former Attorney General M A. Diskin, and William Woodburn, Reno attorney.

At present there are three outstanding possibilities for the Democratic nomination for congress, but only one has thus far announced he will be a candidate. He is Maurice J. Sullivan, defeated candidate for the same post at the last election.


