

STATE DEMOS PERPLEXED AS RACE NEARS

RENO, Nev., Feb. 29. (AP)—Nevada has entered upon a political year which in its early stages finds the Republicans apparently already united upon all major candidates and the Democrats seemingly facing certain disagreement over nominees for senate and house and for President.

So far as the Republicans are concerned, leaders said here today, there seems to be complete agreement that both Senator Tasker L. Oddie and Representative S. S. Arentz again will be the unanimous choice of the party to succeed themselves in the national congress. Both are avowed candidates and would seek reelection on their records.

Indications also are that the Nevada delegation to the Republican national convention will be pledged to the support of President Hoover.

The Democrats face entirely different prospects.

Trial balloons have been sent up already for eight possible candidates for United States senator; there are three outstanding candidates for Congressman Arentz's seat, while the "Roosevelt for President" boom of a few weeks ago seems to have quieted down as more talk is heard in support of advancing Senator Pittman as a favorite son candidate.

The principal struggle among the Democrats, however, likely will revolve about the senatorial nomination, with every indication pointing to a lively battle at the September primary.

Judge P. A. McCarran, former supreme court justice, has been the man most frequently mentioned as a candidate, but he himself has as yet made no public announcement that he will run.

Other senatorial prospects are Ed W. Clark, Las Vegas banker; Norman J. Barry, Reno attorney; H. R. Cooke, former Democratic state chairman; Charles L. Richards, defeated candidate for governor in 1929; Judge George S. Brown, university regent; former Attorney General M. A. Diskin, and William Woodburn, Reno attorney.

At present there are three outstanding possibilities for the Democratic nomination for congress, but only one has thus far announced he will be a candidate. He is Maurice J. Sullivan, defeated candidate for the same post at the last election.

The others are E. C. Mulcahy, publisher of the Sparks Tribune, and Homer Mooney, Carson City attorney. Some mention has been heard, too, of Fred Alward of Las Vegas.

TO OPEN BIDS ON ROAD JOBS

CARSON CITY, Nev., Feb. 29. (AP)—Bids will be opened by the state highway department during March and April on roadwork in five counties involving expenditure of approximately one-half million dollars. Details follow:

White Pine county: Reconstruction between Moorman ranch and Robinson summit, a distance of about 15 miles.

Mineral county: Reconstruction, including grading and additional gravel surface, between 13 miles east of Hawthorne and Hawthorne.

Clark county: Concrete bridge over the Virgin river between Glendale and Bunkerville, replacing steel and timber structure washed out by recent floods.

Eureka county: Reconstruction between four miles east of Dunphy and the Eureka-Elko county line, a distance of approximately 18 miles.

Lyon county: Reconstruction consisting of grading, surfacing with gravel, and additional structures, a distance of 11 miles.

Construction of four miles of new highway between two miles east of Moundhouse and Dayton on the Carson-Fallon road.

Bids on the Carson-Fallon road project in Lyon county and the bridge in Clark county will be opened April 13; the others on March 16.

'JAZZ KILLER' IS RELEASED

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, Calif., Feb. 29. (AP)—Dorothy Ellingson, who went to prison six and one-half years ago a flaming-haired "butterfly girl" who had killed her mother, emerged from San Quentin today a woman of silence.

"I do not care to be interviewed or pose for photographers," she said as the massive gates of grim San Quentin clanged open. Her green eyes were covered by brown spectacles. She shielded her face with the collar of her mail-order brown coat.

Dorothy, a mature woman of 23, was vastly different from the gin-mad girl who seven years ago shot down her mother, stepped over the body and went on the "party" she had been forbidden to attend.

"Please forget me," she said to Mrs. George Black, the prison matron who escorted her to a temporary refuge in San Francisco. "I studied during these long years. I want to live a different life."

GANGMANGOES FOR LAST RIDE

NEWARK, N. J., Feb. 29. (AP)—Izzy Presser, gunman, burglar and rum runner for 25 years, was taken for a "one way ride" tonight that brought an abrupt end to his criminal career.
