

LEONARD ALSO TO TRY RETURN

NEW YORK, Mar. 1. (U.P.)—Benny Leonard joined up with Jack Dempsey today in trying to prove the fallacy of the old ring axiom, "they never come back."

The once great lightweight champion, off at the age of 36 to a successful start in his second comeback attempt, is confident his skill has been unaffected by his long absence from the ring.

If Benny comes back he will be a miracle of sports and a mighty popular one. Leonard has more friends in the metropolitan area than any boxer. Tommy Loughran is popular. So is Jimmy McLarnin. But "Bennah" Leonard—well, that's something else again.

Just for example, Leonard slipped and fell during his bout with Billy McMahon last night. A photographer closed in and snapped the prostrate Leonard. Leonard enthusiasts nearly mobbed him and almost broke his camera. Police intervened.

Smart boxing men will tell you Leonard may be the exception. He quit the ring some ten years ago, retiring as undefeated lightweight champion. He was independently wealthy. The market broke him. And it's for financial reasons only that he wants to come back, making the middleweight championship his ultimate goal.

RED SOX HURLER CRITICALLY ILL

CENTURY, Fla., Mar. 1. (U.P.)—Ed Morris, Boston Red Sox hurler, was in a critical condition at Century hospital here tonight suffering from stab wounds received in a fight during a fishing excursion. He has a chance to recover. Joe White, filling station operator, was held in jail at Brewton, Alabama, in connection with the stabbing. Charges against White were withheld pending a definite change in Morris' condition.

Curacao, a dominant-Maracaibo colt, has the best record of this number. In eight starts last year he won twice, placed twice and finished third on three occasions. His victories were in the Grab Bag handicap at Saratoga and an unimportant over-night event. His earnings were \$5,350.

A powerful looking bay with a diamond shaped blazed face and a white stockinged right hind leg. Curacao weighs 1,050 pounds and measures slightly more than 16 hands in height. He is regarded by Bill Brennan, his trainer, as the best derby timber of this uncertain lot, but is regarded as no better than a 300 to 1 chance in the winter books.

Semaphore, a pennant colt out of Freshney that got away to a good start as a juvenile is Brennan's second choice, but is quoted at only 100 to 1 by betting commissioners. An aristocratic looking fellow with beautiful white and chestnut coloring, he is easily the best looking thoroughbred in the Greentree stable.

Jib Boom, the gelding, is by Whiskbroom II out of Jibber Jib. His record is unimpressive and Brennan did not entuse over him. Byzantine, a brown Prince II-Theodora offspring, is a rather weak looking colt and has shown nothing to date. Both are 300 to 1 shots. Twenty, the filly, is by St. German-Unity and has wintered at the Greentree stables in New Orleans. She is not regarded as being of derby calibre.

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
