AUTO WRECKING PLANT TO BE BUILT AT RIVER

Started recently, one of the largest automobile wrecking plants in Nevada will be opened in Boulder City, located off the highway at the entrance to the city, across from the Standard Oil storage plant.

The wrecking plant will be owned and operated by Ben Bernstein, owner of a similar establishment in Las Vegas. Bernstein said yesterday that the Bureau of Reclamation had already given him 94 cars to wreck at his new plant, with the idea of keeping old cars from being left lying about the reservation.

TWO MEN SUFFER MINOR INJURIES

While working with a crew of men removing timber from tunnel portals, P. Johnson received a severe foot injury. A piece of timber 2 by 12 dropped on his foot breaking several bones. Another minor accident was recorded yesterday when G. Leaver, Six Companies miner cut off the tip of the middle finger of his left hand.

Ed Sherman, Johnson's yellow worker was overcome at sight of his buddy's misfortune and was rushed to the river camp first-aid station. His condition at first was thought serious as he had stopped breathing necessitating the use of a pulmotor. He was later sent to his home at Williamsville.

town there are very few—if any—individuals who are qualified to do this class of work. It was therefore not possible to hire local people owing to the hazards connected with the work. It was necessary that only experienced men in this type of work be employed.

408 NEVADANS
"A check of the records shows that there are 408 Nevada citizens employed on Hoover Dam work, and considering the fact that none of the contractors who form the Six Companies Incorporated are Nevada citizens, it shows that it was not the intentions of this office to discriminate against Nevada citizens. Our records further show that last week there were thirty-one Nevada citizens employed and the Committee in going over the applications of these individuals who were employed this past week, recognized a number of them who were tax payers of Las Vegas.

WAR VETERANS
"The specifications for the construction of the project have only one preference clause contained therein, and has to do with preference at the time of employment for war veterans, who have served their country during the war with Spain, the war with Germany and the Philippine Insurrection.

"As the class of labor we are called upon to furnish changes with the completion of the tunnels, it is expected that unless qualified war veterans are available, we will be in a position to offer townspeople jobs—and it is certainly not the intention of this office to discriminate against any individual or group of individuals for employment if they are qualified to perform the duties called upon."

WASHINGTON, Mar. 3. (U.P.)—Dropping its heavy cares for a few minutes, the senate today debated "the love life of the bull frog."

Senator Pat Harrison, Democratic spell-binder from Mississippi, brought up the subject to renew his attack on Secretary of Agriculture Hyde, whose department has issued pamphlets on this and many thousands of other subjects. Hyde has defended the government's issuance of these pamphlets, and Harrison took occasion today to quote the epithet which former Senator James A. EXPANSION PLAN AT B. C. STORES

Work is rapidly progressing in the meat, grocery and vegetable department of the Boulder City company stores.

The expansion program allows for approximately 50 per cent increase in space to be occupied by the meat department with additional space for fresh fish. Two new sections of refrigerated display cases such as are now in use will be installed.

The size of the vegetable department is being increased 50 per cent. It will occupy the store room adjoining the grocery department, the two being connected by a large arched passageway. Numerous tables and two long rows of shelves along the walls will permit the display of a large assortment of fresh fruits and vegetables.

To accommodate the rapidly increasing trade in the grocery department the floor space here will be increased approximately 25 per cent and with the addition of new tables the display of from 50 to 75 cases of canned goods and other edibles will be possible.

The store building next adjoining the grocery department is now occupied by the Six Companies electrical department. Here one will find a complete line of electrical goods and appliances including, General Electric Refrigerators, Radios, stoves, fans and vacuum cleaners.

"It is no secret that Las Vegas has some knockers. One tin-eared pessimist will devastate the work and good will of ten live boosters. The doubters, scoffers, and chronic pinkies should look about a bit and compare our present sound prosperity with the prostrated condition of many communities in the country which have no hope for the future growth or prosperity we rightfully expect.

"One can't reason with knockers. They criticize an attempt to tare down all constructive effort. They engage in scandalizing community personalities. They see good in nothing. Their diabolical argument is heaped on all who will listen.

"There is no room in Las Vegas for knockers. Why not silently boycott them? AGED WOMAN IS FOUND PRISONER

BOISE, Mar. 3. (U.P.)—Dressed in dirty wollen rags, Mrs. A. Aument, 71, was discovered today in an unheated garage attic room at the rear of a house where she had lived virtually a prisoner with her son, Leroy Aument, police reported.

The aged woman explained to officers that she possessed an uncanny fear that she might "burn up or fall down steep ladder-stairs" if she were not locked up continually.
