He first met George Trenkle, Oklahoma City, in a two round bout, but Trenkle held on when not getting hit and escaped the deadly Dempsey punch. Dempsey met Ray Vegas, of Grand Haven, Mich., in a second two-round bout and had this 215 pounder all but out when the gong saved him at the end of the second round. Approximately 4,000 fans paid \$8,000 to see the former heavy champion in action. A heavy rain kept many away from Music hall arena where Dempsey fought. In the semi-windup Tracy Cox, of Indianapolis, knocked out Mickey Doyle, of Philadelphia in the fourth round of a scheduled 10 round bout.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Mar. 3. (U.P.)—Except for a strong opening, rallying tendencies made no further progress in the stock market today and leading stocks gradually relinquished their initial gains as the session progressed.

Market leaders made overnight gains of a fraction to several points as yesterday's momentum carried over but a large flood of realizing sales exerted a sobering influence and the advance was quickly stemmed. Numerous attempts were made after the first half hour to stir up new speculative buying but pivotal shares generally failed to recover their opening levels.

Inability of the market to sweep through this resistance level caused a general reduction of commitments by traders during the afternoon, giving the entire market an irregular tone.

Brokers, however, continued to report important buying on set-backs and several large bull operations were said to be as optimistic as ever over the near term outlook for the market. They said today's irregularity would give the market a breathing spell and a chance to regain technical strength.

Volume of trading continued active in the stock market, bonds continued to make impressive advances, the railroad section as a whole, mounting to around the best levels of the year. Cotton and grains generally followed the trend of the session.

News affecting stocks continued to favor the bull side, although it was not translated into large actual buying orders. English news was considered decidedly encouraging, a further advance in the pound sterling testifying to the tremendous change of sentiment that has taken place at that capital. At Paris, prices on the Bourse soared today in response to yesterday's New York rally and the current repayment of a large part of Great Britain's \$200,000,000 "sterling support" loan to American and French bankers.

From Germany came word that the Reichsbank was sufficiently confident of the outlook to pay off 10 per cent of the \$100,000,000 credit obtained last autumn from American, British and French bankers and the bank for international settlements. The balance of the loan was extended for a period of three months.

Stock traders interpreted these developments as indicating that the foreign financial storm was gradually abating. Sentiment also was aided by increased hopes of a cessation of hostilities in Shanghai, a factor that has served to disrupt business in some quarters.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 3. (U.P.)—Quality of local cattle offerings in the killings classes was much the same as Wednesday. Trade was slow and dull. Most fat steers and yearlings were quotable around 4.50 at 7.25.

Receipts of hogs at the five western points were materially lighter than those of a week ago. Stock pigs and packing sows were steady to 10 cents higher than Wednesday's average. Top fat hogs brought \$4.

Receipts in the sheep department were in excess of the demand. Trade was slow with prices generally 10 cents to 15 cents lower.
