1. The London naval treaty.
2. Moratorium on war debts last summer.
3. The Haiti commission.
4. The firm stand of the United States in the Sino-Japanese dispute.
5. The United States' policy at the Geneva Arms Conference.

WORST DEPRESSION

Walter H. Newton, politician and legislative secretary to the President, made this observation:

"The President has been forced to fight a depression the like of which has never been seen in the world. He has devoted most of his energies to that end, and it seems to us, with some measure of success."

In his economic policy, Mr. Hoover has had non-partisan support in congress. His world court recommendation, however, is still pending in the senate and that body also rejected his appointment of John J. Parker to the U. S. Supreme Court.

VETERAN ACTOR DIES ON COAST

HOLLYWOOD, Mar. 3. (U.P.)—William Holden, 59, prominent stage and screen character actor, died today after a lengthy illness. He came here in 1928 after playing on Broadway for 16 years. While active in motion pictures, he averaged 10 pictures a year and was one of the most popular players in the screen colony.

A paralytic stroke last May necessitated his withdrawal from active work.

TWO FACE GRAND LARCENY CHARGE

Facing grand larceny charges as the result of their alleged possession of articles stolen from an automobile earlier in the evening, Jack Barnett and Frank Smith are being held today for further investigation of the affair.

Shortly after midnight Wednesday, Officer Dan Potter saw the two men making their way across lots on the Westside, and called to them to stop, noting as he did that they dropped several packages they were carrying, he said.

Searching the men, and retrieving the dropped packages, Potter took the men to the station, and was just questioning them when Herbert Pember walked into the station to report that his automobile had been broken open and looted.

Some of the articles found where Smith and Barnett are alleged to have dropped them were identified by Pember police said, and held in Smith and Barnett being held on the felony count.

According to police, Pember's car was broken open with the aid of a heavy iron bar, and four suit cases removed. The car was parked on south Second street, between Fremont and Carson streets, when the robbery occurred. According to Pember's report, the clothing and personal belongings stolen had a value of more than \$150.

Police say that they have clear finger prints taken from the car, which will be compared with the prints of the suspects. These, with Pember's positive identification of the articles found by Officer Potter, are said to implicate the men.

PANACA DEFEATS VEGAS CATS IN CONTEST

ONE KILLED, ONE INJURED IN SLIDE

SALT LAKE CITY, Mar. 3. (U.P.)—Trapped beneath a huge landslide, one man was killed and another seriously injured today in a nearby canyon.

Floyd E. Deardorff, 28, was almost instantly killed and Roy E. Purcell, 30, was crushed by the huge slide of dirt and rock that had been shaken loose by a dynamite blast. The men, employees of the state road commission, were working with a crew widening the road at the time of the accident.

ORANGE COUNTY GROUP IN VEGAS

Sixty members of the Orange County farm bureau arrived in Las Vegas yesterday on a trip which will include visits to the Hoover dam reservation and other local points of interest.

Last night they were guests of the Las Vegas farm bureau at a dinner given at the Fountain Grill, at which Walker R. Young was the principal speaker. A. H. Harrington, secretary of the Las Vegas Bureau, served as toastmaster.

The entire group is to gather this morning and drive to the Dam reservation, where they will be met by Walker R. Young, who will personally escort them over the reservation and through the canyon site of the dam.

COMPOSER DIES

RIGA, Latvia, Mar. 3. (U.P.)—Eugen D'Albert, 67, pianist, and composer, died today. He was born in Glasgow but was a naturalized German. D'Albert was a pupil of Liszt. He was married and divorced six times.

DENTIST ADMITS SLAYING HIS MOTHER

SEATTLE, Mar. 3. (U.P.)—Dr. Albert G. McKeown, dental surgeon, broke down in his cell late today and told officers he murdered his 81-year-old mother, Mrs. Rhoda McKeown, of Muscatine, Ia., by striking her on the head, authorities announced.

The aged woman was brought to Seattle last December. At that time the son influenced her to draw \$1,400 out of a bank, police said.

Dr. A. Royal McKeown, physician and elder son of the victim, charged his brother with the murder when Mrs. McKeown's body was found, with skull fractured, in the basement of the dentists' home. He said his brother had obtained approximately \$10,768 on notes from his mother. The notes were to be cancelled in the event of her death.

SLUGS OFFICER; SOON IN PRISON

A. L. Hansen, 44, got in his licks last night, but will probably be sorry before the day is done. Officer Dan Potter found Hansen rummaging around in the lot next to the De Luxe restaurant on lower Fremont. He placed him under arrest, ordered him to climb into the police car. The man turned, landed a blow on Potter's chin, started to run. Potter called out and Hansen ran into the arms of Officer Hord at the Tower service station. He was soon lodged securely in the city jail, charged with resisting an officer, assault and battery. His actions will be investigated.
