MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By RICHARD L. GRIDLEY United Press Financial Writer NEW YORK, Mar. 4. (U.P.)—A sharp reduction in the General Electric Company common dividend took the edge off another promising rally in the stock market today, bringing scattered selling into all sections of the list in the closing dealings.

The market moved gradually higher during the first four hours of trading, but after a meeting General Electric directors announced a reduction in the common dividend from \$1.60 to \$1 annually, upsetting the entire market in the last hour.

Early gains of a fraction to several points in many leaders were quickly erased and corresponding losses substituted. The selling flurry did not last long, however, and many issues were able to recover to their previous levels in the last few minutes of trading. Small gains and losses were about evenly divided at the finish.

Uncertainty regarding what action would be taken on the General Electric dividend restoring trading during the early dealings, with a result that transactions fell to 1,500,000 shares, against 1,700,000 shares in the previous session. This factor, however, did not deter speculative groups from bidding up favorite issues, which generally attracted a strong outside following. Market leaders closed with only minor gains or losses.

Montgomery Ward, favorite among small traders, advanced more than a point to above the 11-level on a large volume of transac-

tions coincident with the annual meeting of shareholders at Chicago at which it was officially revealed that "within the last ten days there has been a noticeable improvement in both the mail order and chain store situation."

Dome Mines, Ltd., continued its advance on a favorable survey of the company by a stock exchange house of traders were encouraged by the manner in which the recently Lethargic Railroad issues followed the early advance in the general market.

Outside markets continued to display a confident tone. Bonds were higher. Grains held most of their recent gains and cotton was improved. Overnight news helped these markets as much as they did stocks. Principal items along these lines was the evidence revealed in the weekly federal reserve condition statement that banks have definitely embarked on their easy money campaign and further signs that the hoarding movement is waning.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK

KANSAS CITY, Mar. 4. (U.P.)—Trade in the cattle market here today was the usual cleanup week-end affair, with prices steady, light receipts, and little done. Steers and yearlings were quotable around \$4 to \$5.50. Calves were steady, veals selling around \$5 to \$6. There was no quotable stockers and feeder market.

Trade in the hog department was active, light receipts, prices strong to 10 cents higher. Top fat hogs sold at \$4.15, with the bulk of sales around \$3.90 to \$4.10.

Sheep receipts were light, but demands was limited, and prices steady. Most feed lambs were quotable around \$5.75 to \$6.10.

Shandon's "Burning Blaze" Is Hope Of West To Take Kentucky Derby

By THOMAS H. NOONE United Press Racing Editor NEW YORK, Mar. 4. (U.P.)—The Shandon arm's Burning Blaze is the chief hope of the west for the Kentucky Derby. This squat, shaggy chestnut, son of Big Blaze and Mexican Tea ranks second to Top Flight as a juvenile money last year with earnings of \$83,625.

As a 2-year-old Burning Blaze was an ungainly fellow, being solid chestnut in color with no discernible markings. He has an awkward stride but nevertheless has a high order of speed, particularly over sprint distances.

The excellent record of Burning Blaze in 1931 affords ample justification for his being one of the choices at odds of 20 to 1 in winter-book betting on the derby. Victorious in half of his twelve starts, he also finished second twice and was once third.

Burning Blaze's first major stake success was in the six-furlong post and paddock stakes at Arlington. He beat Morfair by a nose in that \$25,000 added fixture, while such good ones as Liberty Limited, Phantom Legion, Osculator and Tick On finished in the rear.

Second in importance as well as value on his winning list was the \$20,000 added eastern shore handicap at Harve de Grace. In that six furlong dash he also scored by a nose at the expense of Hygro, coming from behind through the stretch. Tick On also finished unplaced in the Eastern shore.

In the \$10,000 added Richard Johnson stakes at Laurel, the westerner again led Tick On to the wire. This time, however, the Loma stable colt was second, beaten only a little more than a length.

His first race at a mile was the Spalding Lowe Jenkins handicap, also at Laurel, and on this occasion Burning Blaze trailed Osculator and Tick On in third place. He wound up the season by running a dull race in the Annapolis handicap at Pimlico.

FT. MYERS, Mar. 4. (U.P.)—Connie Mack divided the Philadelphia Athletics into two squads today for a six-inning contest. The regulars, launching seven runs in the first two innings, won by a score of 9 to 5.

CINDER STARS PREPARING FOR A. A. A. MEET

By STUART CAMERON United Press Sports Editor NEW YORK, Mar. 4. (U.P.)—The old rath-rah spirit, usually an absent quality at indoor track meets, will be broken out in large and imposing quantities when the annual Intercollegiate A. A. A. championships are held here tomorrow night.

For while most indoor track sessions are concentrated on the performances of the leading stars and on the bitter individual rivalries that every season contains, the Intercollegiate feature the team championship.

Four university squads are conceded possible chances of winning the meet. The favored team is that of New York University. The chief rivals are Pennsylvania's champion defending squad, and the men who wear Harvard's crimson, "Dark Horse" considerations go to the red-shirted Cornell runners and jumpers.

New York's hopes for victory will ride on George Weinstein and Bernie Krosney in the sprints, Frank Nordell in the mile, George Barker in the two-mile, Mort Rebeck in the weight-throw, Charley Jones in the shotput, Krosney in the broad-jump, and on the N. Y. U. two-mile and one mile relays teams. Were it not for the ineligibility of George Spitz, N. Y. U. sophomore who holds the world's record for the high jump, the Metropolitan squad would be an odds-on favorite.

Chief interest in the championships centers on the one-mile relay. Its final event on the program and if form results are obtained throughout the evening, the team championship may be decided by the relay.

The N. Y. U. quartet is the favorite. Made up of Harold Lamb, Joseph Healey, Sid Shiefner and Harry Hoffman, it is the fastest team ever produced in the city. Penn is the secondary favorite in the relay. Its team of Howard Jones, Horace Steel, Jimmy Healey and William Carr has scored many notable victories. Penn won the 1931 relay championships in record time of 3:17.8.
