## THREE CORNERED RACE FOR DEMOS

RENO, Mar. 4. (AP)—Prospects for a hotly contested three-cornered race for Democratic national committee from Nevada increased this week when a drive was started to place the name of George B. Thatcher, Reno attorney, before the next Democratic state convention as a candidate. R. L. Douglas of Fallon already has announced he will be a candidate, while the present committee, S. M. William Woodburn, Thatcher's law partner, is the apparent head of the Thatcher drive, which had its official beginning this week when letters went out to prominent Democrats over the state asking their favorable consideration of his candidacy. The letter, signed by Woodburn, characterized Thatcher as "a Democrat of the very highest order."

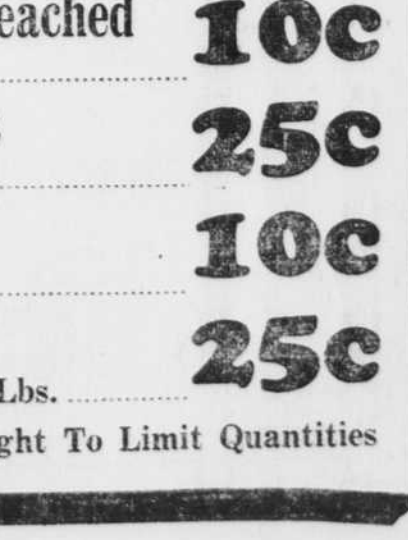
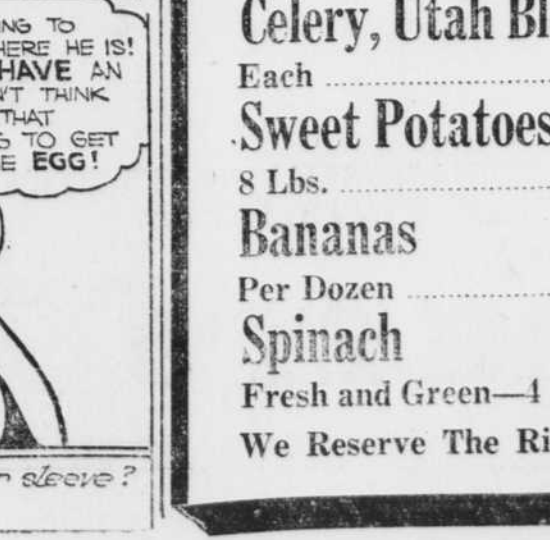
