BUD BODELL TO HEAD POLICE ON RESERVE; CLAUDE WILLIAMS NOW CHIEF RANGER FOR PROJECT AREA

Effective yesterday, the policing power in Boulder City and the federal reservation was consolidated in one organization under Chief Bud Bodell. The plan has been under consideration for some days. Deputy U. S. Marshal Claude Williams has been placed in a newly created position with the title of Chief Ranger. His department will have charge of traffic on the reservation, especially the matter of permitting visitors to drive

down to the river to inspect the work. It has been found necessary by reason of the largely increased traffic and the number of visitors desiring to go down to the river where they would be apt to be in danger. Marshal Williams' office is in the administration building. Bud Bodell and his deputies have headquarters at the municipal building which also houses the jail and the post office.

FRANK MORAN FORMS BOULDER CITY BASEBALL TEAM; PLENTY MATERIAL FOR TWO SQUADS OUT FOR TRY-OUT

FIRST EXPERIMENTAL BATCHES OF CONCRETE POURED AT RIVER PLANT

Following a series of tests, experimental batches of concrete were poured for the first time from the world's largest machine of its type, at the low level plant near the dam site last week.

The plant which was designed to mix 75% of the concrete to be used in the construction of the huge dam as well as all concrete for tunnel linings is fully automatic in operation.

Each one of a battery of four mixers is capable of loading, mixing and discharging a 16 1/2 yard batch of concrete every 3 1/2 minutes.

The concrete is discharged from the mixers directly into cylindrical agitators mounted on a truck chassis. The concrete is kept in motion by the turning of the cylinder and arrives at its destination in perfect condition.

Three of these trucks are now in operation with 15 additional trucks of the same design on hand ready to be used in placing the three-foot concrete lining in the diversion tunnels.

The first concrete poured under terms of the Six Companies, Inc., contract were used in the foundation for the trash rack structures which will be built in front of the upper portal of diversion tunnel Number Two.

Official tabulations of concrete yardage poured on trash rack structure foundations show 130 yards poured Saturday, 160 yards Sunday and 160 yards yesterday.
