MIAMI, Fla., Mar. 7 (U.P.)—Favorable teams found the going difficult in second round play for the \$5,000 international four-ball golf championship today.

The defending champions, Willie Mac Farlane, Tuckahoe, N. Y., and Wiffy Cox, Brooklyn, were eliminated by Harry Hampton, Chicago, and Neal McIntyre, Indianapolis, 3 and 2, in the most surprising upset of the day's queer play.

Gene Sarazan, Lakeville, L. I., and Tom Farrell, Mamaroneck, N. Y., winners of the fourball title in 1929, defeated Joe Turasa, White Plains, N. Y., and Harry Cooper, Chicago, 3 and 2.

Tommy Armour, Detroit, and Ed Dudley, west open champion, Wilmington, Del., defeated Tony Manera, White Plains, and Clarence Clark, Bloomfield Hills, N. J., 5 and 4.

A committee consisting of H. N. Gambill, H. S. Dadrach, and Leo Roth presented the resolution the conclusions reached by the group, which resolution was unanimously adopted by vote.

The resolution spoke favorably of the proposed addition to the courthouse, including additional jail space, justice court room and office, and sheriff's offices. It also recommended that the present jail property be sold, and that the addition, if built, be constructed through the employment of laborers and craftsmen of long time residence in Las Vegas and Clark county wherever possible.
