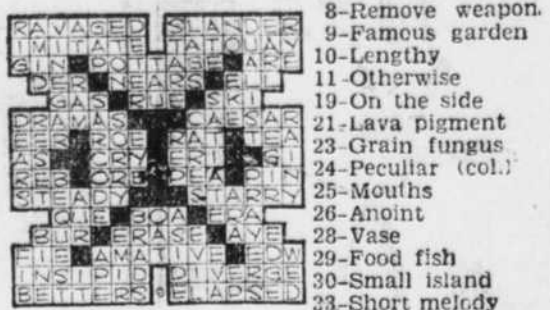

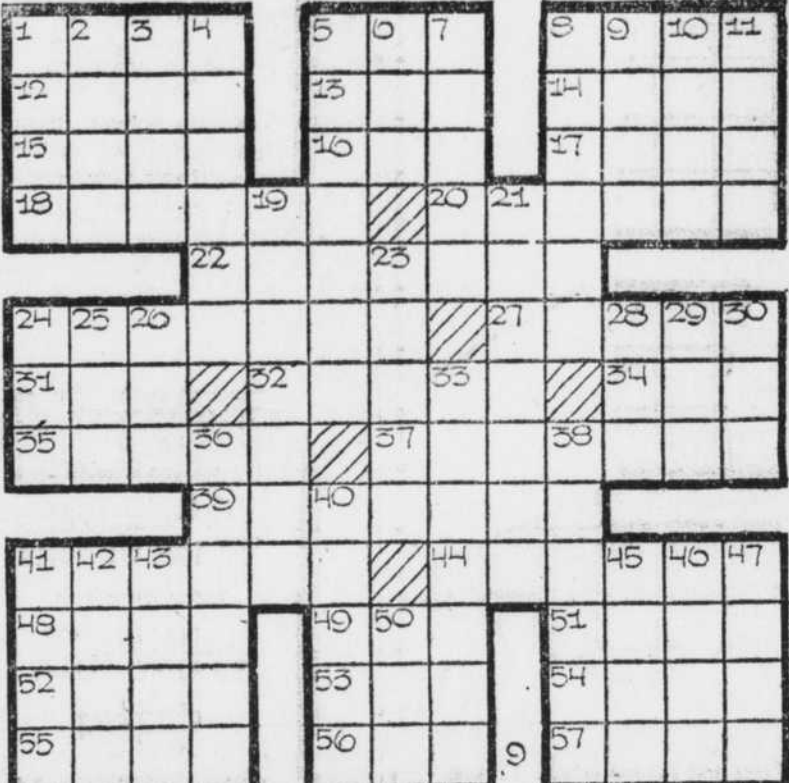

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Mar. 7. (U.P.)—Stocks today gave up half of the gains made in the short session Saturday. Lending issues bore the brunt of a decline which was most severe in the last half hour. Earlier in the day the market swung back and forth in a relatively narrow run, although at one time the whole list was moving forward and prospects appeared bright for a higher closing.

However, the news pertaining to the market was not of the caliber to bring in buyers. The magazine, Steel found steelmakers barely able to sustain operations at 25 per cent of capacity and Ford orders still in the talk stage. There were some encouraging factors including better structural steel, railroad and tin plate orders and unchanged prices.

There were many exceptions to the decline. Early in the day a long list of issues which closed on the high Saturday, made new highs for the year.

The oil group was firm throughout the session, closing unchanged to fractionally higher. When Homestake Mining reported earnings for 1931 equal to \$9.70 a share, against \$5.49 in 1930, the issue soared 7 points. Monsanto Chemical spurted to a new high for the year on its earnings of \$2.98 a share, against \$1.73 a share in 1930. Hudson Motors slipped off despite a 30 per cent increase in sales in February as compared with January.

Lambert moved up sharply when the regular dividend of \$2 quarterly was declared. In the foods, new highs for the year were made in the early trading by several issues. Goodyear and Kelly-Springfield made new highs in the rubber division. United Fruit made a new high for the year, as did Coca Cola, National Cash Register, Zonite Products, Electric Power & Light and Chicago Yellow Cab. The bond market was firm with United States government issues apparently unaffected by the treasury flotation of \$900,000,000 new. Japanese bonds held well in the face of a crash in the yen, and other foreign issues were strong. All bonds slipped down from their highs before the close. Commodities were lower, cotton closing unchanged to 8 points lower, while all grains made fractional recessions. Call money held at 2 1/2 per cent but the rate was firm. The pound sterling soared to a new 1932 high. Trading was slightly under that for last Friday, sales aggregating 1,600,000 shares, against 1,500,000 on Friday.

BRIGHT SPOTS IN BUSINESS

Hudson Motor Car Co. reports 30 per cent increase in sales during February. Consumers Coal Co. recalls 550 workers to resume operations at Hammarville mines March 14. De Soto Motor Corp. reports 31.4 per cent increase in sales during first three weeks of February against 1931 period.

Homestake Mining Co. reports 1931 net income of \$2,136,599, against \$1,422,870 in 1930. Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad reports increase of 115 cars in freight loadings for last week.

Katz Drug Co. reports 1931 net profit of \$474,646, against \$375,431 in 1930. American Hide and Leather Co. increases tannery operations to 60 per cent of capacity, against 45 per cent in January.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK MARKET, Mo., Mar. 7. (U.P.)—Lighter receipts in most classes of livestock and colder weather stimulated a demand for all classes of meat animals. Trade on all better grades of cattle was fairly active, with prices strong to 25 cents higher. Steers sold around \$5 to \$7.75 with some heavy steers at \$8 and yearlings up to \$8.27. Hog trade was active and prices higher. This supply was cleaned up early at 10c to 15c higher than Friday. Pigs sold around \$3.25 to \$3.65. Top fat hogs brought \$4.35. In the sheep department salesmen asked sharply higher prices and scattered sales were steady to strong. Fed lambs were quotable around \$6 to \$6.50.

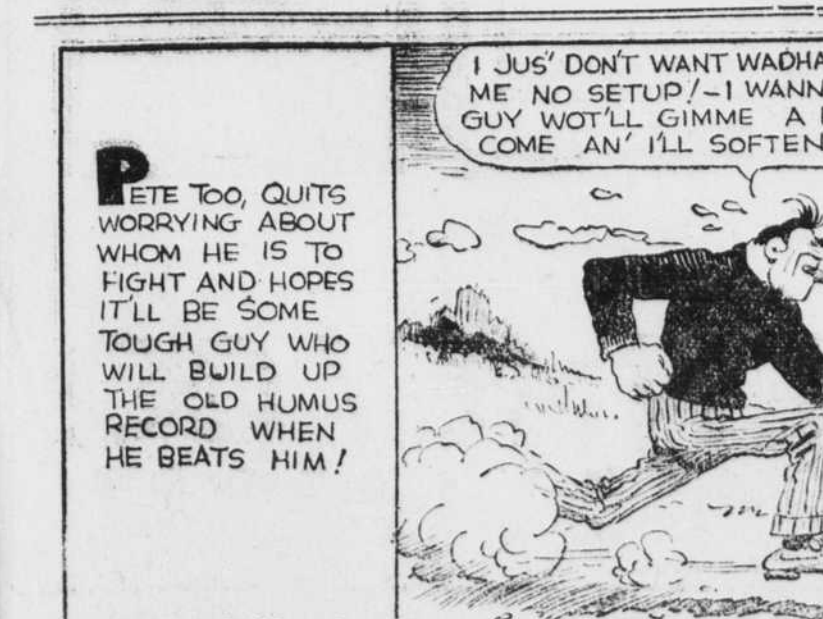
