The child can go without fear of reprisal, has complete authority to arrange for the transfer of the ransom and the restoration of Charles Augustus, without danger of police action.

There was a denial—one of many—that ransom was mentioned in the original note left by the kidnapers when they snatched the baby from his cradle last Tuesday night.

### LEGION JOBLESS MEETING TO BE HELD TODAY

The second meeting in connection with the unemployment situation in Las Vegas will be held at the Legion hall at 7:30 tonight.  
Two weeks have elapsed since the first meeting at which time a general discussion was held by representatives of all local organizations to see if some feasible plan could be worked out in connection with the local situation.  
These various representatives have now had time to report back to their organizations concerning the proposed plan of action and it is hoped that the same representatives will attend this second meeting with some definite plans outlined, upon which to proceed, providing it is the consensus of opinion that some definite stand can be taken in Las Vegas.  
This is a national movement and the results since the start of the campaign February 15 have been very gratifying, say Legion men, publicity being given to the fact that over 200,000 men had been returned to permanent employment throughout the country.  
It is now up to the business men and other employers of labor in Las Vegas and Clark county to decide whether they wish to do something to boost this national total organization leaders said.  
The American Legion is anxious to get an expression of opinion locally in order that they may do their bit in assisting the national department of the American Legion in this program," they concluded.

### FEDERAL FINES MOUNT TO \$1,700

Fines totaling \$1700 were assessed yesterday morning in eight liquor cases tried before Judge Norcross of the federal court.  
Abatement proceedings were filed against Vincenzo Cali, of Caliente, and the defendant given twenty days to answer.  
David Barrett, named in abatement proceedings against The Lattice, on Boulder highway, was also given twenty days in which to answer.

The Motor club, in proceedings naming Fred Buser and Walter W. Wood, was ordered closed for one year. The Motor club is located at 122½ North First street.

A violation of the National Prohibition act charged against Cincenzo Cali resulted in his being fined \$250.  
John McCormick, of the Little club, pleaded guilty to a charge of possession and sale of liquor, and was fined \$250.

W. C. Huff, also pleading guilty to possession and sale charges, for violations in Searchlight, was fined \$350 and costs, to be paid in installments, Huff to be on probation until the fine is paid.

George Green, of the Paris club, Las Vegas, was complained against on two counts, violation of the prohibition act and maintaining a nuisance. He was fined a total of \$450, \$150 on the first count and \$300 on the second count.

George Shuman, owner of the Nevada club, in Caliente, was also convicted of violation of the prohibition act and maintaining a nuisance, and was fined a total of \$400, \$150 on the first count, and \$250 on the second count.
