TREE PLANTING IS STARTED AT BOULDER CITY; PRIZE WINNING YARD CONTESTANTS ARE CHOSEN

With the arrival of the first of eleven car loads of trees and shrubs in Boulder City, planting of these beautifying agents was begun yesterday.

The first planting was along the curbs lining New Mexico street, and working through the Six Companies residential district. Five varieties are being planted. They are Arizona ash, Black locust, Carolina poplar, Chinese elm and sycamore.

Wilbur Weed, landscape engineer in charge of the work in Boulder City, said yesterday that the planting would continue around the main government buildings and parks, and then around the government permanent residences. To householders, he stressed the need for careful early care of newly planted trees, urging that each householder provide plenty of water for the new trees and shrubs.

Co-incidental with the start of the government planting yesterday, came the official announcement of prize winners in the Boulder City company's contest for the best kept houses and grounds in Boulder City.

First prize, \$15 in gold, will be awarded to Mrs. Tom Regan, 688 Avenue C. Second prize, of \$10 in gold, will go to Mrs. Bernard Farr, 655 Avenue B.

Three special prizes, consisting of shrubs donated by the Boulder City company, were awarded to Mrs. Charles W. Stuart, 652 Avenue D; Mrs. Dan Hartle, 828 California ave., and Mrs. George Beckley, 656 Avenue C.

Special mention is to be made of F. O. Weathers, 607 California ave., Mrs. H. H. Shields, 701 Fifth street, Mrs. E. H. Speelman, 1205 Fifth street, Mrs. E. M. Stokes, 647 Avenue C, and Mrs. Mack Tremholm, 717 Fifth street.

The prizes will be awarded March 10 by V. G. Adams, manager of the Boulder City company.

WOULD QUARTER MARSHAL IN L. V.

Fred S. Alward and Ryland Taylor yesterday, members of the Chamber of Commerce committee appointed to investigate the matter of holding federal court sessions in Las Vegas, made a report.

Three civil cases to be tried before juries have been set by Judge Norcross for trial in Las Vegas next November, Attorney Taylor reported. He further stated that Judge Norcross is in favor of having a deputy clerk and marshal with headquarters at Las Vegas as soon as quarters are available.

Also that federal prisoners would be held in the Clark county jail when adequate jail accommodations are provided.

It was stated that Judge Norcross is in favor of such amendment to the act as to carry out the spirit of the law providing for federal court sittings in Las Vegas.

AIRLINER HITS MILL; 2 KILLED

EAST ST. LOUIS, Mar. 8. (U.P.)—A Century air liner crashed into a windmill here early today killing two pilots and injuring three others, a few hours after the Chicago Aero commission exonerated the company of unsafe operation charges.

Although the accident occurred at 2 a. m., officials would not reveal names of the dead until the wreckage had been cleared away and a representative of the company had arrived from Chicago several hours later.

L. H. Atkinson and John K. Kirk of Chicago were killed. Sydney Cleveland, Goldfield, Ia., and Ira Smalling and Theodore Graff, of Chicago, were injured. All were licensed pilots.

They had been practicing night landing in a 10 passenger Stinson training plane.
