

# DOUBLE MAIN EVENT CARDED FOR LEGION FRIDAY NIGHT SHOW

A double main event has been carded by Matchmaker Art Harris for Friday night's American Legion fight card, featuring four tough light heavyweights who have been making such names for themselves locally that an elimination series has become necessary to settle their training quarters arguments.

Last match on the card is the six round go between Johnny Roth and Tiger Joe Williams, colored 160 pounder, who has threatened to run the rugged Utah lad out of the ring.

Roth says that Williams won't come out of his corner for the fourth round, if he lasts that long, and has promised the Tiger the worst beating of his career.

Both boys have been doing a lot of talking in their daily workouts, and several times have almost tangled without benefit of the cash customer. As a result of their heated pre-fight arguments, both have posted \$25 appearance forfeits, and in addition have agreed to fight on a winner take all basis.

Until the match was made, these two boys had no active dislike for each other, but the final signing for the fight elicited several cock-

sure remarks from Roth, with the result that the heat has grown more intense daily.

Other main event is between Jerry Stone and George Gray. Stone in his last appearance, pulled a surprise KO victory out of the bag when he stretched Emmett Wade out for the count after two previous knockdowns. Gray, fighting Chuck Dye in his last appearance, was fifty per cent of the best ring battle ever seen in Las Vegas, and copped the nod over Dye. Since that battle, Stone has been gunning for a match with the Detroit until he finally got it. Stone is a slugger without any knowledge of boxing, and Gray is liable to outpoint Jerry unless he forgets to duck a haymaker.

The semi-final is to be a four-round scrimmage between Chuck Dye and Pancho Villa, two more 160 pounders. Dye, in his fight with Gray, made himself a nice reputation for clean fighting, and will have a lot of followers rooting for him Friday night. Dye is gradually working around into condition, and a win over Villa should ready him for a main event go, if a suitable opponent can be secured.

Matchmaker Art Harris has

three other four-rounders booked, and promises that they are possible show stealers. All of the fighters are working out daily at the Legion arena, where local dopsters are watching them go through their paces. Harris has invited the public to attend the workouts, with the result that the observers are increasing in number daily.

## DYNAMITE FOUND; ANARCHIST HELD

CHICAGO, March 8. (U.P.)—Federal agents arrested an admitted anarchist here today as a suspect in the Easton, Pa., bomb outrage after finding two trunks filled with dynamite, nitroglycerine and other explosives in his home.

"Certainly I'm an anarchist," said Colombo Boris, alias Joannis Borris, when Assistant Secretary of Labor Murray W. Garson questioned him. Garson said he found a quantity of anarchistic literature together with the trunks of explosives. There was enough of the latter in Boris' house, said authorities, to wreck the largest skyscraper in the city.

Boris was placed under \$100,000 bond. Although no formal charges yet have been filed against him, Garson said some of the wrappers on the confiscated dynamite were similar to those used in Easton, where two post office employees were killed and five others were injured. The bomb which exploded there had been mailed to a prominent Italian-American.

## Dorwood Stable Pins Derby Hopes On Morfair, Consistant Winner in 1931

NEW YORK, March 8. (U.P.)—Victor Emanuel's Dorwood stable pins its Kentucky derby hopes on Morfair, whose sire won the event a decade ago. The sprinting son of Morvich-Mormaw is quoted at 50 to 1 in this early date, but the odds will shorten if he can develop staying qualities in the near future.

Morfair won five of his eleven races last year, was second three times and third once. His earnings were \$25,400. His richest purse was the \$15,000 United States hotel stakes at Saratoga, in which he beat Osculator, Tick On, Mad Frump, Universe and others. This brilliant effort came only a week after he had lost the rich post and Paddock stakes at Arlington by a nose to Burning Blaze.

After disappointing in the Grand Union hotel and Hopeful stakes, Morfair came to Belmont park and annexed the Futurity trial purse, then set a dizzy pace in the Futurity but burned himself out early and finished third behind Top Flight and Mad Pursuit.

Trainer J. P. (Sammy) Smith reports from Aiken, S. C., where the speedy chestnut is wintering, that Morfair has grown big and strong and is expected to earn his share of the rich 3-year-old prizes to be decided this summer.

Universe, a bay colt by Infinite out of Plaid, is Thomas M. Cassidy's derby candidate. In nine starts last year, he won three races, including the Youthful stakes at Aqueduct and the Eastview stakes at Empire City, besides twice finishing second and third, to earn \$20,000. He is quoted at the short price of 30 to 1.

Universe beat Morfair by three lengths in his debut at Jamaica in April, and a few days later ran fourth in the Colorado stakes. Soon afterward he came through with an easy victory in the Youthful. After his Youthful victory the Cassidy juvenile ran second in the Hudson stakes and lost the Great American by only two noses. With only Fall Apple and Renaissance to beat in the Eastview, his task proved easy.

Betting commissioners conceded Universe a colt of derby calibre, and his chances of going to the post in that classic are held to be good.

## AKRON'S MISHAP SPOILS FINALE OF ROSENDAHL'S DECADE IN AIR

LAKEHURST, N. J., (AP)—The jinx that wrecked the lower fin of the U. S. S. Akron also destroyed some hopes for the big dirigible's skipper, Lieut. Comm. C. E. Rosendahl.

It spoiled his show for congressmen waiting to go aboard and learn at first-hand how well the Akron could fly, it probably upset plans for a triumphal transcontinental tour for Pacific coast maneuvers and it dashed his ambition for a grand wind-up to his current lighter-than-air career.

For Lieut. Comm. Rosendahl is going to sea. His airship work, which has occupied him for nearly a decade, will be at least temporarily at an end that he may have the necessary sea duty to qualify for promotion.

His successor is Comm. A. H. Dresel, former commanding officer of the Los Angeles and a navy man since 1905 when President Roosevelt appointed him to Annapolis.

Comm. Dresel has been in lighter-than-air work since June, 1929, previously having had extensive duty afloat and a two-year term at the naval academy. He holds a navy cross for distinguished ser-

## CONGRESS WETS OPEN BEER DRIVE

WASHINGTON, March 8. (U.P.)—Congress "wets" today proposed beer be legalized and taxed at \$5 a barrel as a substitute for the new tax bill's heavy levies on amusements, telephone and telegraph messages, medicine, clothing and canned goods.

Three Democratic members of the ways and means committee submitted the proposal in a supplemental report, estimating that from \$450,000,000 to \$550,000,000 would be raised by this method. They said that in addition to eliminating these specific taxes, the sales tax could be cut from 2 1/2 per cent to 1 1/2 per cent.

Pleading for support of drys when consideration of the bill starts Thursday, the report, signed by Reps. Thomas H. Cullen and Christopher D. Sullivan, both of New York, and John W. McCormack, Mass., said: "The revenue (of the beer tax) will come wholly from those states whose people look at this question from a more liberal viewpoint."

Most of the Democratic leaders and the prohibitionists, however, took a firm stand against the proposal to legalize beer of 2.75 per cent alcohol by weight, the equivalent of nearly 4 per cent by volume.

## TUESDAY IN CONGRESS

### SENATE

Senator J. Hamilton Lewis, Dem., Ill., introduced a resolution for repeal of the eighteenth amendment and to give states control over liquor traffic.

Added \$10,000,000 to the agriculture department appropriation bill to establish agriculture and livestock credit corporations.

Senator Borah, Repn., Ida., said he was considering introducing a bankruptcy bill proposed to him by Paul Beardsley, trust officer of a Sioux City, Ia., bank.

Judiciary committee continued consideration of the nomination of Judges James M. Wilkerson, Chicago, to the circuit court of appeals.

### HOUSE

Three Democratic representatives proposed legalization of beer to aid in raising revenue to meet the treasury deficit.

Rabbi Stephen Wise, of New York, pleaded with the immigration committee to end the "intolerable cruelty" of present restrictions.

Representatives of peace and civic organizations before the foreign affairs committee approved the Fish resolution for a multilateral treaty to export arms and munitions to belligerent nations.

Passed the Norris-La Guardia anti-injunction bill.
