MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, March 8 (U.P.)—Sensational recovery in the British pound sterling indicating growing confidence in Europe enthused security markets today.

The 20-cent rise to \$3.73 in the pound drew attention from the stock market and encouraged bull traders who bid up prices throughout the list from fractions to several points.

Trading in stocks approximated yesterday's volume of 1,600,000 with buying operations largely centered on the petroleum shares which continued to benefit from indications of a tariff on crude oil in the new tax program before congress.

Improving conditions in Germany were indicated by a reduction in the Reichsbank's discount rate from 7 to 6 per cent.

Traders saw in this development and the rise in the pound a gradual return to normal in Europe, considered by many a necessary forerunner of industrial recovery in this country.

Domestic and foreign bonds kept pace with the rise in the stock market but cotton and grains held within a comparatively narrow range.

Other commodities were mixed, a sharp advance in Coaco being offset by a severe decline in silk. United States government bonds were again firm on returning confidence in this country, spurred by dwindling bank failures and efforts to balance the federal budget.

Buying activities in stocks made considerable headway in many directions although no "strong arm" buying operations were conducted, most large traders being satisfied to allow the gradually spreading confidence to buoy prices for the time being.

The usual handful of stocks did not move with the general market. International Telephone was weak in anticipation of the dividend meeting later this week at which a further reduction in the annual 6-cent dividend is feared despite estimated profits of \$1.20 a share in 1931.

Western Union ran up sharply by news of the close on declaration of a dividend of \$1 a share on the capital stock, a larger payment than had been expected. New Haven preferred spurred 4 points on declaration of the regular quarterly dividend of \$1.75 a share.

Unsatisfactory conditions in the automobile industry in the first two months of this year, however, were indicated by sales figures for the period made public by General Motors corporation. This caused scattered selling of the stock.

General Motors in February sold 68,650 cars to all dealers, against 74,710 in January and 96,003 in February, 1931.
