WEDNESDAY IN CONGRESS

SENATE Passed a resolution expressing deep regret over the death of John Phillip Sousa. Heard a favorable report upon the state, justice, commerce and labor supply bills.

Agriculture committee favorably reported the Norris bill for government operation of Muscle Shoals. Foreign relations committee discussed Walsh world court resolution for an hour without reaching an agreement.

Proposed \$5,500,000,000 bond issue for public works endorsed by Col. S. F. Thompson, a Boston contractor. Chairman McNary of the agriculture committee reported favorably a resolution for investigation of the farm board and the grain and cotton exchanges.

Vice President James Hecksher of the Irving Trust Co. of New York, warned the silver committee against adopting a bimetal standard of any kind. Chairman John Barton Payne of the American Red Cross assured Rep. Hamilton Fish, Repp., N. Y., that some of the flour from farm board wheat would be distributed among the needy in New York.

Naval affairs committee adopted a resolution opposing the transfer of part of the naval academy from Annapolis to the University of Southern California. Ways and means committee defending new billion dollar tax bill as essential in balancing the budget and maintaining the nation's credit.

Passed Cochran bill providing a penalty of 20 years in jail or fine of \$5,000 or both for sending threatening, extortion or ransom letters through the mails.

FAVOR BOROTRA IN N. Y. MEETING

NEW YORK, March 9. (U.P.)—Jean Borotra of France, four times United States indoor champion, was the favorite tonight to win this year's tournament after the list of entrants and the seedings of players had been announced by the United States Lawn Tennis association.

Despite the fact that Borotra is fading as an outdoor player, and although he has announced his retirement from Davis cup singles competition, the French court croquet ball's skill on the boards is still so fine that he must be given the favorite's place.

Actually, France has both the first and second favorites, many tennis enthusiasts predicting the second French player, Christian Boussus, will go farther than Borotra. Boussus' play has improved by the proverbial leaps and bounds during the past twelve-month. He's regarded definitely as the French No. 2 Davis cup player. (Henri Cochet, of course, is the No. 1 of France.)

Draw for the indoor championship was made today. The field is of record size. There were originally 98 entries, but the tournament committee arbitrarily chopped 18 names from the unwieldy list.

TENNIS SEASON ON U. P. COURT TO OPEN

Commencing on some date between March 15 and 20, the U. P. tennis club will open the tennis season with a ladies tournament, either singles or doubles, as the committee sees fit.

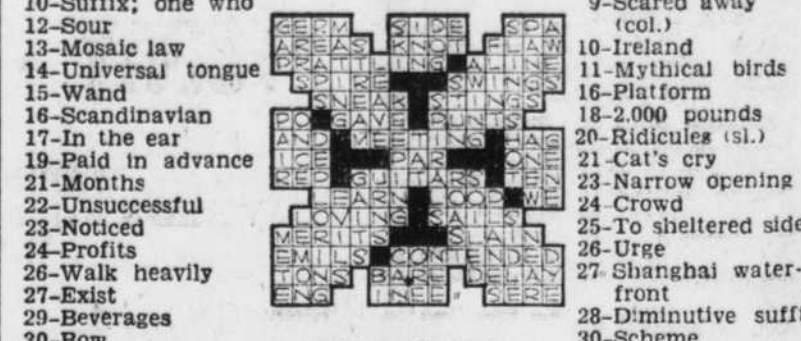
A suitable prize will be given the winner. Only paid card members will be eligible. After the ladies finish a men's tournament under the same rulings will be started.

President Lightfoot has made up the following committee to handle the ladies part of the game: Miss Alice Hansen, Miss Margaret Klinge and Miss May Stone.

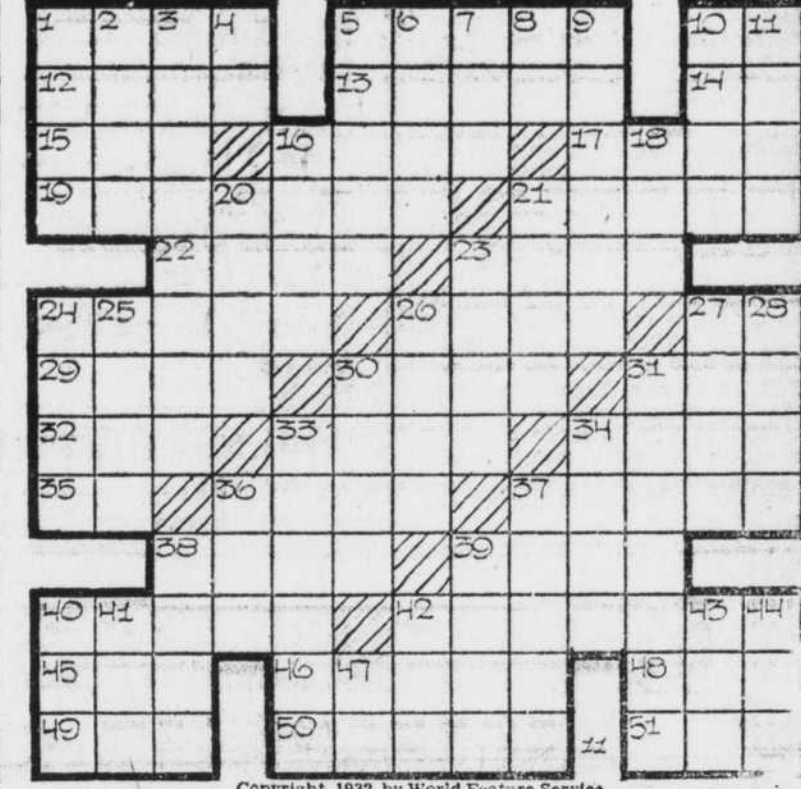

ARMOUR, DUDLEY MEADOWS FORMS LEAD IN TOURNEY BASEBALL TEAM

MIAMI, Fla., March 9. (U.P.)—Tommy Armour, British open champion, and Ed Dudley, western open titleholder, scored a decisive 3 and 2 victory over Billy Burke, national open champion, and the veteran, John Golden, Noroton, Conn., to win the \$5,000 international fourball golf championship on the Miami Country club course today.

The champions never were down during the entire match. They took a lead at the first hole in the morning round, with a birdie four, which they maintained throughout most of the play.

Armour and Dudley rounded the turn of the first nine in 34 strokes, two under par and their opponents' 36, and increased that lead at the 13th when Dudley holed a birdie three.

It was at this point that Golden and Burke had their bid to star in the competition. Golden summoned the skill and experience of a thousand golf battles to sink a 10-foot putt halving the 14th and winning the 15th with a birdie two. He holed another long one on the long par-five 16th hole and sank an eight-footer for a birdie four to put his team on one down.

Then Burke came through with a perfect pitch shot for a birdie four to square the match at the 18th. Burke and Golden had a 32 for that second nine. The aggregate medal score was tied at 68 all.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By RICHARD L. GRIDLEY (United Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, March 9. (U.P.)—Unable to maintain an upward trend for more than a few hours at a time, the stock market slipped off again today, losing a large share of the gains scored in the preceding session.

Prices did not have the buoying effect they did yesterday on the 20-cent recovery in the British pound sterling, and other news developments of the day had little effect on the main body. Sales volume fell to 1,300,000 shares from 1,600,000 share.

Price movements were exceedingly narrow through the morning trading and few issues were able to better their opening levels. Selling increased during the afternoon despite special buying operations in individual issues.

Evidence that bull forces were effect of the future trend of the market was given in the heavy buying operations in speculative favorites. Auburn, which upset the entire market recently with sharp sinking spells, showed surprising strength, holding the greater part of a 4-point advance at the close.

Simultaneously, special buying operations went ahead in Stone & Webster, Gold Dust, Fourth National Investors, International Telephone and many of the packing stocks on speculative outside buying.

Most of the United States government issues reached new highs for the year, bolstered by the government's determination to balance the budget with a billion dollar tax increase now being considered by congress and by the gradually returning confidence in capitals of the world.

While the pound sterling failed to continue its sweeping gain of the previous session, it was able to maintain the greater portion of the rise, increasing hopes that it would become stabilized around current levels for the time being.

The British treasury is endeavoring to keep the currency at a stable level because of the unsettling effects that wild movements have on general business transactions. The mid-week business statistics made public today gave little ground for encouragement to stock market traders, although they did not remove hopes of ultimate spring revival.

The Iron Age noted a gain in steel ingot production from 25 to 27 per cent of capacity without the aid of buying by the large steel consuming industries like automobile, railroad and building.

Much interest was aroused by the forthcoming report of unfilled orders of the United States Steel corporation as of February 29 to be made public at noon tomorrow. The January 31 figures showed a new low in the corporation's history but few in the trade expect the February results to show more than a small gain at the best.

Automobile stocks, with the exception of Auburn, were adversely affected today by the February production statistics of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, showing a loss of 5.7 per cent from January and 48 per cent from a year ago. Oils were not helped by a further reduction in the industry's gasoline stocks in the past week.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK KANSAS CITY, March 9. (U.P.)—Cattle receipts at the western markets were light and trade was slightly better, with prices on the Kansas City market steady 16 to 24 cents higher. Steers sold around 5.50 a 7.50; cows 2 a 3.75; and stockers and feeders 4 a 7.

With a light supply of hogs prices were somewhat better. Pigs and packing sows sold around 3.25 a 3.85. Top fat hogs brought 4.10. Bulk of sales ranged around 4.35 a 4.40.

Receipts in the sheep department were moderate and only scattered sales were reported. These were slightly better than Tuesday. Fat lambs sold around 6.25 a 6.75; feeding lambs 5 a 6; yearlings 5 a 6.
