MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, March 11 (U.P.)—The market at no time developed anything approaching acute weakness today but the trend was unmistakably downward, most of the leaders finishing around their lows of the day at losses of a fraction to several points.

Turnover at 1,300,000 shares was not much in excess of yesterday's volume of a million shares and continued firmness in giltedge bonds was a redeeming factor. Neither cotton nor grains showed much speculative participation on either side of the market.

Many traders were apparently anxious to "cash in" on their paper profits in stocks accumulated over the past few weeks of raising prices and offerings were in excess of the demand attracted by buying demonstrations in a handful of specialties.

Brokerage houses were almost unanimous in advising clients to rebuy stocks on the scale down but this advice in many instances was not heeded. Many traders were of the opinion that the next recovery would begin at lower levels and acted accordingly.

Because of the relatively narrowness of the trading today, most observers were even more in the dark regarding the immediate course of the market. They were inclined to stand aside until the market gave a clear indication by its own action as to what might be expected in the near future.

Many of the industrial leaders today broke to new lows for the current movement. Among these were United States Steel, American Telephone, American Can, General Motors and Westinghouse Electric. Losses in these issues ranged from a fraction to several points.

Among the larger individual sales in the oil group were 22,000 shares of Socony-Vacuum at 10 1/2, off 1/4; 15,000 Ohio at 6 3/4, off 1/4; 5,000 Prairie Pipe Line at 8 3/4, off 1/4; 5,000 Sinclair at 6 1/4, unchanged and 5,000 Prairie Oil and Gas at 8 3/4 up 1/4. These issues monopolized dealing and accounted for a large market in the oils but at the same time said that conditions in the oil industry would have to show a great improvement if this was possible.

Another issue to attract widespread attention was Auburn Auto, in which large short interest is security locked. From its recent security of 83 1/2, Auburn reached 101 1/2 today and closed at 99 1/2 for a gain of 3 1/2 points. Some traders were buying Auburn and selling General Motors short as a hedge.
