



In Shanghai the Chinese are mournfully burying their dead and trying to recover something from the ruins of the great Chinese quarter of the city. They are without shelter from the cold and in a starving condition. So many are dead that no attempt is made to identify the bodies as they are thrown into crude graves.

Yet all the deep tragedy of this great disaster is forgotten by most of the world because the Lindbergh baby has been kidnaped.

THE MASTER

The body of John Philip Sousa, March King, was yesterday escorted to the Congressional cemetery near Washington by the United States marine band. The master hand, now still, made the Marine Band world famous. Poignant memories must have stirred in the breast of some of the old-time members of the great organization as they played for Sousa for the last time.

CRITICS CRITICIZED

Nevertheless the constant ridicule and abuse afforded all productions is having the effect of completing the destruction of the theater.

It is quite proper that a critic should point out the defects of a play and the delinquencies of the players. Yet such criticisms should be balanced reasonably by a description of the play and mention of its good points. Constructive criticism will renew the interest of the public in the theater. A continuation of the smart-aleck, sneeri ing type of criticism will complete its destruction.


