RED MILL DANCE MARATHON TO START TODAY; RESORT REOPENS

Starting from the Overland hotel at noon today, 32 contestants will start Las Vegas' first marathon dance, being sponsored by Phil Boughman, owner and manager of the Red Mill night club, where the dance will be held.

With no telling how long the dance will last, the main attractions among the couples entered will be Warren Farrell, local fighter, and his partner, and Donnie King, local dancer, and his partner. King expects to walk off with the prize, in spite of the friendly threats of Farrell and his partner, who have posted a sizable wager with King.

Special arrangements have been necessary and the management of the Red Mill has done everything possible to make these arrangements as complete as possible.

There will be a registered nurse and dietician in charge of the girl contestants, in the person of Mrs. Pat Barnes. She will be in full charge of the diet and care of the girl partners, and will see that no girl does herself physical injury by staying in the contest longer than she is able.

A physician will also be in attendance for both men and women during regular periods, his services to be secured by the management of the Red Mill.

The dancers are to dance 45 minutes out of each hour, being allowed eleven minutes' rest, and given four minutes to resume the floor. They will be fed seven times in each 24 hours, and will eat while dancing.

Marathon dances in the east have many times vied with the six day bicycle races in piling up attendance records.

SWIM STAR MAY GIVE LESSONS IN LAS VEGAS SOON

Well known about the Pacific coast as a swimming coach, Bob Sheridan of Los Angeles, recently arrived in Las Vegas to spend the summer, and possibly arrange with one of the local swimming pools to act as instructor.

Sheridan is an expert swimmer himself, but has gained his greatest reputation as an instructor and coach. For several seasons he was the coach, instructor and trainer for the San Pedro naval reserve training camp, during which time he was chief mentor for their crack tank team, and under his guidance the team was winner of several large meets.

During his service with the naval reserve, he established what was at that time a national record for the number of men taught to swim in a week, 178 men having passed their swimming ability tests.

In recognition of his ability both as a swimmer and an instructor, Sheridan was made a life time examiner of applicants for life saver certificates, by the American Red Cross.

After twenty years' experience training men to swim, Sheridan's system of teaching aquatics was adopted in many of the naval reserve stations, and was adopted by the U. S. navy athletic board from among several systems for navy instructors.

Other teaching and training posts held by Sheridan in the past ten years were with the University of California, San Diego Rowing club, Seattle Athletic club, and life guard examiner for the Southern California Beach association.

Among other activities Sheridan plans to pursue is the organization of a Las Vegas chapter of the American Red Cross life saving organization, for the splendid training it provides young men and women.

RENO CAGERS STATE CHAMPS

Reno high school's fast stepping hoopers are the Nevada state basketball champions this morning, as a result of their hard won victory over the Tonopah five last night by a score of 20 to 19.

Forced to play a three minute overtime period, with the score at the end of the game standing 18 all, the Reno lads won the cup with a last burst of speed netting them one field goal, to overbalance Tonopah's one point penalty score.

The game stood 5 to 7 in favor of Tonopah at half time, and both teams fought from there to the tie at the end of the game, forcing the overtime.

Playing before a packed gymnasium, Tonopah's Murphy was the high score man for his team and for the game with eight points to his credit. Semenza was the high point man for Reno with six tallies.

CALIFORNIA TEAM DEFEATS FRENO

BERKELEY, Calif., Mar. 12. (U.P.)—University of California took a 70-2-3 to 60-1-3 victory over Fresno State in their dual track meet here today before a crowd of about 2,000.

Bob Kiesel, California's sprint ace, was star of the meet, taking the 100 and 220 yard dashes and running a lap in the relay. Walter Marty of Fresno came in for a share of the limelight with his high jump of six feet four inches.

Most of California's points were garnered in the track events, while the Fresnoans proved strongest in the field events.

HENRYS AGAIN U. S. CHAMPS

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Mar. 12. (U.P.)—The Wichita Henry's tonight won their second straight National A. A. U. basketball title, when, playing precise and careful ball, they overcame a 9 to 4 lead held by the Maryville, Mo., Teachers, to win, 15 to 14.

It was the lowest scoring total ever recorded in a final game in the tournament, which has been held here annually for eleven years.
