### U.P. NET RULES IN EFFECT HERE NOW

So rapidly has the U. P. A. C. tennis group grown, that it has become necessary for the members to formulate new and stringent rules pertaining to the use of the courts by non-members, according to John Lightfoot, president of the club.

Use of the courts by members of the group, both for two tournaments now under way, and for friendly games, has dictated the new policy, due to the resulting demand for playing space.

Under the new rulings, non-members of the group will be required to pay a fee of twenty cents per set for the use of the courts, payable in advance to Thomas Guthrie, who

has been appointed by President Lightfoot to take charge of the courts. Members will be required to show their membership cards to Guthrie at the time of taking a court.

A set, when non-members are playing is limited to a period of 35 minutes. Both members and non-members will abide by the standard rules in force at the U. P. courts, that is, the odd game will decide the set. When members of the organization have the courts, non-members must await their time.

"These new rules, effective at once, may appear drastic," Lightfoot said yesterday, "but the association cannot attempt to furnish free use of the court and net to all comers."
