NEW YORK, March 15 (U.P.)—The doubles field was cleared of a standout singles match on the morrow in today's play in the 33rd Annual National indoor tennis championships.

The greater part of the day was devoted to reducing the doubles pack down to the round of eight, but two singles matches being played. But these two matches saw Berkeley Bell, the tumbling Texan, defeat Ernest Krosian, 6-2, 6-1, and Jean Borotra, defending champion, eliminated Eddie Jacobs of Baltimore, 7-5, 6-3. The victories placed Bell and the veteran French Internationalist in the quarter-final round where they will reenact tomorrow their final round battle of 1931.

Borotra won that engagement, but whether he will be able to repeat the performance is quite another thing altogether. For Bell, in smothering Krosian today play-

ed finer tennis than did Borotra in subduing Jacobs. The Texan had all the qualities of greatness today. His forehand was remarkably powerful and accurate. His backhand was little less effective, and his work in the short court reminded one of Vince Richards in his prime. To make matters complete, Bell was an unflinching court coverer, going after any and all shots and getting most of them.

Borotra found the Baltimore southpaw a very troublesome opponent, particularly in the first set. In this set games followed service until the eighth when Borotra broke through to lead at 5-3. Jacobs came right back, however, to break Jean's delivery and take the tenth game to tie things up at 5-5.

Borotra found his real stride in the second set and had things in hand all the way. As always, Borotra's chief weapons were a flawlessly executed forehand drive, and a decisive short-court volley.
