MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By RICHARD L. GRIDLEY NEW YORK, Mar. 16. (U.P.)—Confronted with a number of adverse domestic business developments and another series of dividend reductions and omissions, the stock market continued its decline today.

Even the Kreuger issues, in which it was hoped liquidation had been brought to an end, suffered a fresh relapse on omission of common and preferred dividends by International Match and news that trading in issues of this class would not be resumed when the Stockholm exchange reopens next Monday.

Except for a brief period of strength at the opening, the market moved slowly downward through the entire session, checked at frequent intervals when short sellers took profits. Selling was heaviest in the last hour when most issues reached new lows for the current reaction.

The Kreuger issues again were the center of attention, Kreuger & T. S. touching another record low at \$1.50 a share, a loss of 62 1/2 cents and International Match preferred striking a new bottom at \$8.50 a share, a loss of \$4.50. Bonds of both companies were also weak, all of them setting new low marks. Both common and preferred dividends, which had been \$4 annually, were omitted by International Match, presumably as a precautionary measure pending settlement of Ivar Kreuger's affairs. Unexpected reduction of the R. H. Macy dividend from \$3 and extra to \$2 annually set off a flood of selling in this department, store favorite, the issue losing 8 points at one time.

Other important dividend news which less influenced the affected share than did the Macy action included omissions on Granby and Ohio preferred, and Granby Consolidated common, and reductions on Consolidated Cigar, Otis Elevator, and Marlin Rockwell. Unsettled financial conditions in Sweden incident to the Kreuger difficulties were indicated by omission of dividends by the Swedish Ford subsidiary. Reports from the steel industry

BRIGHT SPOTS IN BUSINESS

By United Press Americans export trade during February was \$5,000,000 greater than January, the first increase for February since 1916, according to the commerce department.

Two hundred and five industrial enterprises served by the Associated Gas & Electric system expanded their operations during 1931, the system reports.

Connecticut Electric Service company's report shows earnings for the year ended Feb. 29 were equal to \$3.74 a share, against \$3.64 a share in the preceding fiscal years.

WEDNESDAY IN CONGRESS

SENATE Senator Bingham, Repn., Conn., submitted an estimate based on reports of governors of most of the 48 states that 6,000,000 persons are unemployed.

Interested parties strongly favor federal control of interstate motor passenger carriers. C. D. Cass, counsel of the American Electric Railways association told the Interstate Commerce commission today.

Two leaders of Chicago anti-crime organizations informed Senator Borah, Repn., Idaho, that opposition to the confirmation of Judge James H. Wilkerson who sentenced Al Capone, to the federal circuit court, was inspired by gang leaders.

Rep. Luce, Repn., Mass., urged the banking and currency committee to expedite action on the home mortgage bank bill.

Foreign affairs committee reported favorably the Fish resolution to instruct the American delegation to the Geneva disarmament conference to propose a world wide agreement renouncing the sale and export of munitions of war.

President Edward O'Neal of the Farm Bureau federation supported a measure designed to level commodity prices through federal reserve manipulation of currency and credit.

Objected to the mandatory injunction clause in the Norris-La Guardia measure curbing the powers of the federal courts against the press and labor, and sent the bill back to conference.
