

L. V. MUSICIAN MISSES DEATH

The opening of Lorenzi Lake park dance pavilion tomorrow night came near a rude interruption Wednesday night when it was learned that the first car of the calvacade of orchestra players met with an accident about three miles this side of Baker, California, and the occupants narrowly escaped serious injury or possible death.

The first car, a light sedan, owned and driven by Al Johnson, who is the leader of the orchestra, struck a patch of fresh oil on the highway and rolled over, coming to a stop resting upside down on its top. The occupants, Mr. and Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. C. Chaplin of Las Vegas, crawled out of the car while the wheels were still revolving and the motor still running.

Other cars of the party, containing the rest of the orchestra, were right behind, and the other musicians helped turn the sedan right side up. It proceeded to Las Vegas under its own power.

The orchestra opened Saturday night at Lorenzi's and will play for dancing Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday nights. The music, according to L. McDonald, manager of the resort, will be broadcast over KGIX.

SOUTHPAWS TO BATTLE AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, March 17 (UP)—Dave Maier of Milwaukee and George Nichole of Buffalo, a pair of southpaws, will meet in a 10-round bout at the Chicago stadium tomorrow night with recognition of the National boxing association as world's lightweight champion awaiting the winner.

The N. B. A. withdrew its recognition of Maxie Rosenbloom of New York as champion several months ago, and Maxie and Nichole are survivors in a tournament staged to select a new titleholder.

Maier won a 10-round decision from Rosenbloom at Milwaukee, Jan. 1, this year which gives tomorrow night's battle added importance.

Maier, who scored a technical K. O. over Nichole at Buffalo November 27, 1931, continued to rule a 7-5 favorite today. Nichole, who entered the tournament a 100 to 1 shot, has developed a habit of going in the underdog and coming out the winner.

In each of his tournament bouts he has been on the short end of the betting, but in turn has knocked out Don Petrin in 5 rounds, won an 8 round decision from Charley Belanger and 10 rounds decision from each Lou Scozza and Billy Jones. He had Belanger, Scozza and Jones on the floor from his straight left, an unorthodox punch for southpaws, who usually are nookers or swingers.

Maier's two tournament victories were an 8 round decision over Roy Williams and a 1-round knockout of Able Bain. The withdrawal of Baxter Calmes and Harry Ebbe, enabled Maier to reach the final with only two bouts. Since he has been under the management of Lew Sansof, Maier has won 12 straight bouts, seven of them by knockouts.

CHINESE KILLER ESCAPES "CHAIR"

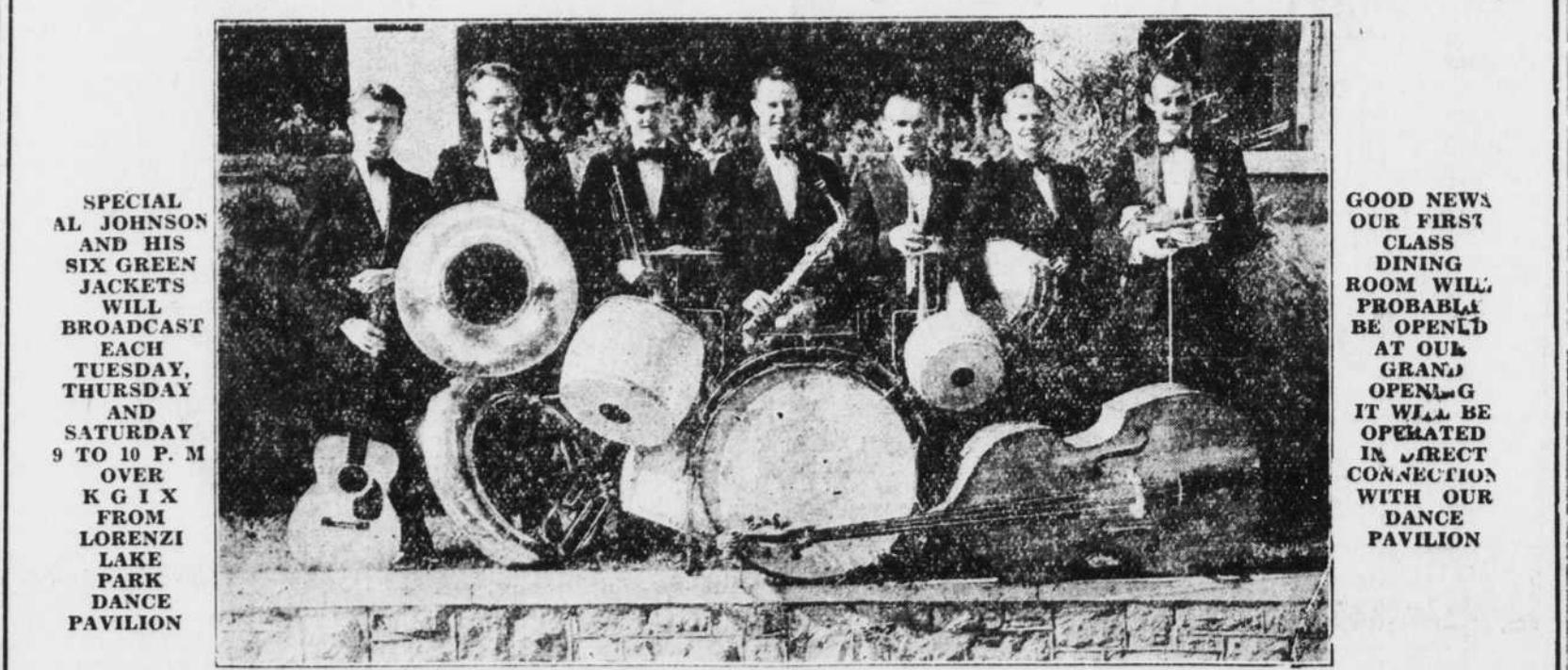
SANTA FE, N. M., March 17 (UP)—Woo Dak San, diminutive Chinese, today won a five-year fight to escape the electric chair.
