MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, Mar. 21 (U.P.)—Financial and commodity markets regained their composure today, prices on various exchanges recovering a portion of their recent losses in dull trading.

The recovery in stocks exercised a cheering influence on Wall street which had feared that recent declining tendencies would develop into a general slump. Wheat recovered a cent and cotton moderately. Rubber, however, broke to new lows on abandonment of production restriction measures by Great Britain and Holland who account for four-fifths of the world output.

Trading in stocks was dull throughout the session. Prices opened slightly lower on an accumulation of week-end selling orders; but quickly stiffened and climbed upward to the close when best levels were reached. Gains were small, however, and a handful of special issues continued their decline into new low ground, which served to discourage important buying.

Washington advices regarding possibilities of passage of the proposed manufacturers sales tax over stiff opposition were interpreted favorably inasmuch as passage of the measure would insure balancing of the federal budget and remove another uncertainty overhanging business.

Another helpful development was the reassurance given Saturday by President Hoover regarding the financial outlook of the nation's railroads, a factor that continued to exert favorable influence on railroad stocks today.

Violent selling against the Krueger issues which upset the market on several occasions last week, appeared to be subsiding. Krueger & Toll closing unchanged at 1 1/4, although International Match preferred, a subsidiary, broke 2 1/2 points to a record low at 47 1/2. Last week the \$5 annual dividend was omitted. Further repercussions of the Krueger tragedy were felt at Stockholm when trading was resumed after a week's enforced shutdown, three brokers and a small savings bank closing their doors.

Gains in leading industrial, railroad and utility issues did not run beyond several points. United States Steel closed 1 1/2 points higher at 42 1/2 after touching a new low on the movement at 40 1/2 in the early dealings. Allied Chemical, Consolidated Gas, American Telephone and American Can moved similarly.

Numerous weak spots cropped out. Auburn Auto, selling ex-dividend, broke nearly 6 points and recovered all but a point, while General Motors slid off fractionally to a new low for the present shares at 17 1/2. Other motors were lower, all of them influenced by the imminence of the new Ford models, which are expected to make their formal appearance in a few weeks.

Bethlehem Steel preferred broke 5 points to a new low at 50, where it yields 14 per cent. F. & W. Grand-Silver Stores, Inc., common broke to 3/4 and the preferred to 3/8 off 1/2 point and 47 points respectively. The company is controlling interest in F. & W. 5-10-25 Stores, Inc. and Isaac Silver & Bros. Co., Inc. for which equity receivers were appointed Saturday. Childs Co. sold at a record low of \$3, off 1, and Gimble preferred sold 2 points lower at 14, a yield of 50 per cent on the present 7/8 dividend which comes up for discussion at tomorrow's directors' meeting.
