MOBILIZATION STUDY TOPIC

Army reserve officers from Las Vegas and Boulder City met in the local American Legion hall last evening where the first of four conferences was held which will cover problems relative to their work in case of mobilization.

Captain Harford, local instructor, discussed the war department and corps area mobilization plans with the large group of officers attending. "Las Vegas will undoubtedly be a distributing point for supplies to troops mobilized in the southern Nevada area, as well as the mobilization center of at least one battalion of the 413th Infantry and other troops of the 104th Division," said Captain Harford. It was pointed out, however, that this study is not related to any specific situation or war threat, but is to prepare the officers to better handle the situation if and when such a situation arises.

The local officers hold regular classes on the first and third Mondays of each month, under the auspices of the local chapter of the Reserve Officers association of the United States. All officers commissioned in the reserve are invited to attend, local enrollment now totaling 35 officers. The next meeting will be held April 4.

VETO PERMIT FOR TROTSKY

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, March 21—(U.P.)—The ministry of the interior today decided to revoke permission granted for Leon Trotsky, exiled Soviet red army leader, to enter Czechoslovakia.

The permission was granted for a three months visit to health resorts because of Trotsky's physical condition. It was cancelled on the ground that Trotsky failed to agree to return to Turkey after the three-months period had elapsed and also that he failed to agree to refrain from political activities in Czechoslovakia and not to attempt to escape from the country.

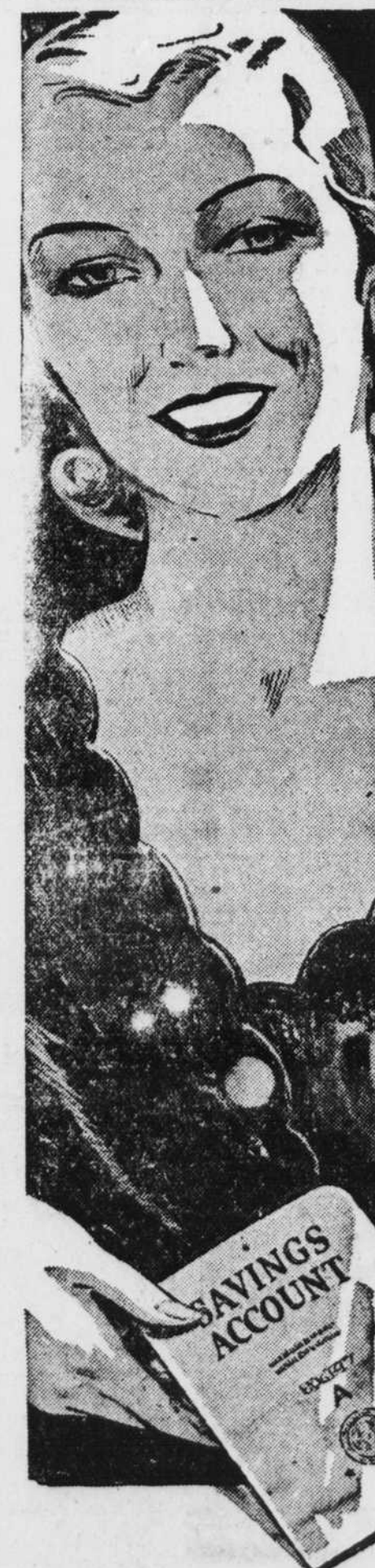
