BOULDER CITY TO GET MODERN HOTEL THIS SUMMER

PERMIT GIVEN GRAY FOR 74 ROOM HOUSE AT B. C.

Work Expected To Be Started At Once On New Hostelry

With the awarding of a permit by the reclamation bureau late last night to W. F. Gray, Boulder City is virtually assured of having a first class hotel this summer. The site for the new hotel was not decided upon last night, according to Sims Ely, Boulder City manager. However, tentative plans were made to build on one of two locations, one being on the hill to the left of the government administration building and the other diagonally opposite from the theater building. Both sites have distinct advantages to be considered. The site opposite the theater is practically in the center of the city, while the hill site would afford an excellent view of the great Mead lake, which will be formed by Hoover dam, as well as a panoramic view of Boulder City and its mountainous background. It is expected that work on the hotel building will start at once.

L. AND K. WILL OPEN NEW SHOP AT BOULDER CITY

Fred Kennedy of the L and K Markets Co., announced the opening of the Boulder City L and K Market No. 4 yesterday afternoon. The new market, located on Wyoming street and Avenue B, is strictly modern in every respect. The market is equipped with one 24-foot electrically lighted refrigerator show case and a four-foot case of the same design, used for the display of a complete assortment of cheese and salad dressings. The meat box, which is ten feet in width by twelve feet in length, is equipped with a Parker cooling system, which guarantees the maintenance of temperature varying from 34 to 38 degrees. Kennedy stated that only high quality meats will be sold at the same low prices with the same good service that is characteristic of all L and K markets. The Boulder market will be under the capable management and supervision of Charles Lowry. Three experienced meat cutters will complete the personnel of the new market. Jack Skelly, an expert meat cutter formerly with the Six Companies market, and well known in Boulder City, will have charge of the shop. He will be assisted by J. Henderson of Salt Lake and L. James of Ogden, Utah. The management extends a cordial invitation to all to visit and inspect the new shop.
