BOARD OKAYS HEAVY BATTLE

CHICAGO, April 1. (U.P.)—The international championship committee has approved the Max Schmeling-Jack Sharkey bout scheduled for New York in June as a world's heavyweight title bout, the National Boxing association announced today. The international committee is composed of Thomas A. Murphy, chairman of the Canadian federation of boxing commissions; Paul Rousseau, secretary of the international boxing union; Charles F. Donnell, secretary of the British boxing board of control, and Latrobe Cogswell, of the national boxing association. The committee also approved the bout between Kid Chocolate and Davey Abad at Havana for the world's junior lightweight title.

SINKING CITY LEFT TO FATE

NAPLES, Italy, April 1. (U.P.)—Two thousand men, women and children—the entire population of Villa Santa Stefano—moved quietly out of the little hilltop village today when their homes began sinking into an underground cavern. A number of houses on Leonina street were the first to cave in. They went down with a crash, but the population was warned and already had begun a wholesale migration from the village in which most of them had spent their lives. The town has been undermined by infiltration of water in the porous ground, forming a huge cavern directly beneath the main streets.

RELAY TEAM BREAKS MARK

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 1. (U.P.)—The New York A. C.'s relay team churned 400 yards for a new world's record of 3:32 1-3 this afternoon in the first qualifying heat of that event in the National Senior A. A. U. swimming championships in the Yale pool. The team bettered its own previous world mark of 3:34 9-10, made in Chicago, April 2, 1931. The Illinois A. C. team finished second in the heat, and Yale came third.

BERG, FULLER FIGHT TO DRAW

NEW YORK, April 1. (U.P.)—Slugging toe to toe for ten furious rounds, Jack "Kid" Berg of England and Sammy Fuller, Young Boston Italian, fought to a draw before a crowd of 9,000 in Madison Square Garden tonight.
