BOULDER POPULATION IS NOW 4500, SHOWS SURVEY

Growing at a more rapid rate than any other city in the United States, Boulder City claims a population of approximately 4,500.

This estimate is based on a compilation of the following statistics. The reclamation bureau now has 28 families living in as many government houses. It is estimated that there is an average of three members to each family. Added to this, the government maintains a camp of 130 men and a dormitory in which 84 men are housed.

The Six Companies have ten dormitories in which a total of 1651 men live. They also have 708 two and three room houses which are occupied by families averaging 3.5 members.

The total number of Six Companies employes is approximately 4029.

It is conservatively estimated that the city with nearly 50 independent business enterprises has a population of 250 other than government and Six Companies employes and their families.

Permits for additional commercial enterprises are being issued almost daily by the reclamation department.

It is thought that the greatest single factor which will continue the city's rapid growth is the building of the new Boulder Inn, a 74-room modern, fireproof hotel, scheduled to be completed this summer.

While rapid in growth, the city is being built for permanency, under the supervision of the reclamation bureau, which is carrying out an elaborate program of city beautification.
