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### DON'T HIDE BEHIND CURTAINS

Windows Should Give Life To Dining Room



China in cupboard catches the sunlight. By HOPE HAMMOND (Interior Furnishings Editor, The Woman's Home Companion, Written For Las Vegas Age) Window treatment has a good deal to do with establishing the glow of friendly formality, which is the ideal atmosphere for a dining room. Possibly the most common error is a tendency to adorn windows overmuch. Excess curtains shut out needed light and air, and a too conspicuous design in draperies will overburden small and moderate sized rooms. Not merely the window itself and its draperies, but also the walls around it and the space beneath it have decorative importance. A china cupboard at the side of the window often becomes the focal center of the whole dining room owing to the preferential lighting which is thrown upon its shelves and their gracious burden of gleaming china, glass or metal. Similarly, a simple side table beneath the window may become highly important to the effectiveness of the whole arrangement, and a vase of flowers, a colorful plant or a lustre pitcher is likely to develop into an essential accent.
