PHAR LAP DEATH SHOCK TO WESTERN TURF FANS

By DAN ROYERMAN (United Press Staff Correspondent) MENLO PARK, Calif., April 5. —Phar Lap, colossus chestnut gelding, died suddenly here today of colic.

Six years old, the giant horse of the flying hoofs and fighting heart stood next to Willis Sharpe Kilmer's Sun Beau as the greatest money winner of all time. A special Tanager event he was to have run this month might have placed him in the lead.

Death of a well-loved and famous human could have caused little more sadness and shock than Phar Lap's passing, if it were not for the fact that he had just become ill.

Dr. Will Neilson, skilled Australian veterinarian, who had watched the horse with all the care a skilled specialist can give a patient, went to work with all the resources of his science.

Other veterinarians assisted. Steadily, the colic grew worse. At 2:30 p. m., the horse, in convulsions, dropped dead.

"He's gone," said Treve "Tommy" Woodcock, trainer of Phar Lap. Sudden tears stood in Tommy's eyes. William Elliott, diminutive jockey who loved the horse with a fierce pride and affection, turned and listened to the news.
