

# Olympic Village in L. A. to House Two Thousand Athletes of 50 Nations

LOS ANGELES, April 6. (AP)—Laid out in a wide amphitheater that used to be an open expanse of wild grass and rolling valley, the Olympic village, which will house 2,000 athletes from fifty nations of the world, began taking definite form today.

Workmen started setting up 550 houses for men athletes and plans called for the village to develop even more suddenly than a well-organized sub-division.

A 330-acre tract in Baldwin hills, southwest of Los Angeles, has already been planted with trees, grass, shrubbery and flowering plants. Five miles of temporary streets and eight miles of water pipe have been laid out.

The Olympic committee in charge of the project have planned carefully to make the village a thing of beauty and convenience. Five dining hall units will be distributed among the neat frame dwelling houses, and a part of each unit will be assigned to each nationality.

At least 2,000 men and women will participate in the games, July 30 to August 14. They will be housed and fed at the Olympic village, where most extra-athletic activities will be centered.

Countries which will have teams entered in the games will be Argentina, Australia, Austria, Belgium, Bolivia, Bulgaria, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Egypt, Estonia, Finland, France, Great Britain, Germany, Greece, Guatemala, Haiti, Hungary, India, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Mexico, Monaco, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Peru, Philippine Islands, Poland, Portugal, Rhodesia, Rumania, Spain,

## MAY ANALYZE STOMACH OF PHAR LAP

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6. (AP)—Chemical analysis may be made of the stomach of Phar Lap, gallant Australian horse that died yesterday.

"I am convinced 'Bobby' died of natural causes," David J. Davis, principal owner of the phenomenal gelding, said. "However, to quiet ugly rumors of poisoning, I may order an examination made."

Further purpose would be to learn if veterinarians' diagnosis of acute indigestion and inflammation from mildewed food was correct. Davis added.

Ed Ferry, owner of the Menlo Park stables in which Phar Lap died, also said a chemical analysis might be ordered.

"Nothing we can do will bring him back," Davis declared, a note of sadness in his voice.

He gave orders for the skin to be stuffed and sent back to Australia, where Phar Lap became next to the greatest money winner of all time and was a national hero.

The Australian government had requested the action, to have a monument to the greatest horse the island continent had ever known.

Tommy Woodcock, trainer and constant companion of Phar Lap through six glorious years of pounding hoofs and hard-won victories, remained inconsolable today.

## CUBS, SOLONS DESTINED TO 3RD PLACE

United Press Staff Correspondent NEW YORK, April 6. (AP)—Judging by the general opinion of the fans and the betting odds offered by the various commissioners, the Chicago Cubs and Washington Senators are destined again to wind up in third place in the National and American leagues, respectively.

The Cubs' hopes of felling the fans and the commissioners would seem to rest largely on the performance of a pitching star named, on paper, at least, appears the equal, if not the superior, of any in the league. The three mainstays of the 1931 team—Charles Root, Pat Malone and Guy Bush—are still on hand. To these three have been added Burleigh Grimes, former Cardinal ace, and Bob Smith, one-time star of the Boston Braves.

Root, Malone, Bush, Grimes and Smith are all right-handers. The only two left-handers on the staff are Jackie May and Dutch Henry. This top-heaviness is a handicap, but any manager with such a layout would be crazy to complain.

Present infield plans call for Stanley Hack, the Sacramento bank clerk, to play third base. But no one would be surprised if Hornsby sent Hack to the bench and took over the job corner himself. The Cubs' stone combination is top notch.

woody pitcher banks along with Jackson and Gelbert at shortstop, and Bill Herman, who batted better than 325 in 25 games with the team last year, is a real second baseman. The veteran and dependable Grimm will be on first.

The Chicago outfield is shoddy. Kiki Cuyler being the only first flight gardener. Riggs Stevenson is a mean hitter, but his legs are getting no better with the passing of the years. He played in less than 85 games last year. Lance Richburg, Vince Barton and Johnny Moore are the other outfield possibilities.

Reynolds was bothered by a game leg playing with Chicago last year, hitting only 290 in 118 games. He's not that kind of hitter, however, for in the preceding three years he cracked the ball for 317 or better.

With Reynolds, Heine Manush and Sam West playing together, the Senators will have just about the hardest hitting outfield in the league. Sam Rice and Dave Harris, both heavy sluggers, will be available for relief work.
